STAGG REMAINS QUIET ON "BIG FIVE" PROPOSITION

Maroon Coach is Making Effort to Secure Big Games for Next Year.

FIVE GAMES ALREADY SURE

Coach A. A. Stagg is still looking for his big games for next football season.

The University of Chicago leader returned this week from his fortnight in the South, with his schedule still in the air and a large desire to land at least four first-class contests for the 1910 gridiron grind.

The coach's expected announcement concerning the recently proposed "Big Five" was the mildest thing the reporters have heard since the agitation for a break in the conference.

Without any of the 1910 games contracted for, Stagg wants to get the schedule finished in short order.

While the coach declined to enter the "big eight" symposium about the "big five," the reporters think he is opposed to the scheme on the ground that Chicago should make no advances of any kind that could be interpreted as attempts to get Michigan back into the conference.

Coach Stagg has received a number of minor suggestions concerning modifications in the football playing rules, but none of importance.

His chief suggestions at the eastern meeting will be regarding the prohibition of pushing and pulling the runner with the ball and modifying the forward pass rules so as to make the pass more popular and thus do away still more with mass plays.

CONFIDENT OF HIS CONDITION

New York, Dec. 9.—Jim Jeffries becomes reminiscent every once-in-awhile. He isn't given to boasting and rarely talks about himself, which makes the following very interesting.

"I think my first fight with Sharkey was about the roughest passage I ever had. Sharkey was the roughest 'tough' that ever drew breath, and when we clashed he started in to play his little games with me.

"The hardest puncher I ever ran against was Bob Fitzsimmons. How that man could punch! I caught one wallop in our second match that made me think of home and mother.
