

OFFICIALS BELIEVE THEY HAVE FOUND BIG SYSTEM

Think Many Chinese Have Been Smuggled Into the United States By Wagner.

TONGS SHIELD THE IMPOSTORS

Immigration officials believe that in the arrest of Robert Wagner at the Soo they uncovered a far-reaching "underground railroad" system by which hundreds of Chinese have been clandestinely imported into the United States by way of the St. Mary's river and the upper peninsula during the last seven or eight years.

Wagner is believed to have been paid large sums of money for bringing celestials across the river from the Canadian Soo. It is said that they have been brought across in a gasoline boat and landed at out-of-the-way-points on the American side, sometimes as much as sixty miles below the American Soo.

Far-Reaching System. Once in the upper peninsula, it is alleged that Wagner had an understanding with certain whites as well as orientals in all parts of the region, whereby those smuggled Chinese were located in cities throughout the Northwest. It is even claimed that this traffic extended as far as Milwaukee and Chicago.

The Chinese so brought into this country are said to have been held practically as slaves under a peonage system. It is stated that among the American Chinese there exists a secret society or "tong" and that this society pays the expenses of bringing their fellow countrymen across the border, the cost of which runs from \$150 to \$300. This amount is charged against the person so brought into the country and he must work out that amount for the many by whom he is employed.

Very Difficult Problem. Immigration officers state that the Chinese problem is the most difficult with which they have to deal. The union among them is so close that what one knows is known to all within a radius of hundreds of miles in incredibly short time.
