MOHAWK YOUTH VICTIM OF HUNTING ACCIDENT

Raymond Labby, aged twenty, a resident of Mohawk, met with an unfortunate accident while rabbit hunting on the Tobacco river, about two miles from Thayer's lake in the direction of Gay, yesterday. Both of Mr. Labby's hands were severely lacerated by gunshot wounds. It appears that the hunter was leaning upon his gun, both hands having been placed upon the muzzle of the same, when the weapon accidentally exploded. The shot passed through the fingers of both hands. Labby was taken to the Mohawk hospital where it was found necessary to amputate one of the fingers of his right hand, and two of his left hand. The young man is the son of Mike Labby, township treasurer of Altonz township. He is reported as resting easy today.

LIGHT HOUSE KEEPER HAS CLOSE CALL AT MANITOU

When the U. S. steamer Marigold removed the keepers of the various lighthouses in Keweenaw county last week, one of them had a narrow escape from death. Of all the lighthouse keepers on Keweenaw point, those at the Manitou Island light, and the Gull Rock light, experienced the most difficulty in reaching the mainland. Stationed at the former light were keepers T. J. Bennetts of Eagle River, first assistant, Paul Kanowski of Alpena and second assistant, A. Champlain of Bay City, and at the Gull Rock light, keeper George Smith of Port Austin, and Chas. A. Jonas of Calumet. In reaching the mainland, first assistant, Paul Kanowski of the Manitou light had a narrow escape from death.

It was believed that more difficulty would be experienced in removing the keepers of the Gull Rock light, than those at Manitou Island, and because of this fact they were taken off first. The men made their way safely to the steamer in a small boat. As Manitou Island is about four miles out, the keepers started in a launch for the Marigold, and came the greater part of the distance safely. When about one-fourth of a mile from the shore, however, the boat upset, plunging the crew into the icy waters. Keeper Bennetts, and Assistant Champlain clung to the boat, but the first assistant was unable to do so and started to swim to the shore. He succeeded in reaching his destination, but was almost exhausted from fatigue and exposure. The other members of the party were transported to the Marigold in small boats, and Kanowski taken aboard later.

The escape adds another to that long chapter of exciting incidents which have marked the attempts of the light house keepers to leave their posts at the close of the season, in this section.

REST IS BEST CURE.

Low Vitality is Usual Cause Says a Prominent Physician. "Rest cure is the best cure, I know of for colds," according to J. Hertz, of Detroit, says the Detroit Free Press. "Few people know this, but once having learned it they never forget. I notice my friend Dr. Joseph E. Roycroft, physical examiner at the University of Chicago, has recently developed the matter to his students in a talk on hygiene."

"When anyone comes to me thoroughly debilitated by a cold, I give them this advice, if practicable: 'Lie down on your bed for two hours in a room ventilated to the fullest extent. Put on gloves, if you want, but let the air in. The chances are the patient will sleep, rise for dinner with a good appetite and spend the evening with a clear brain.'"

"Of course, colds are due largely to low vitality, and are far more common among those with a vulnerable place in the head. If the head is the 'place of least resistance,' any improper physical condition will strike there, but if the patient is otherwise healthy, he can throw off such a cold in 48 hours or sooner. "All said or done, the cure for a cold is the cure for consumption; rest, sleep, repose."

THREE CHINAMEN ARRESTED: VIOLATION EXCLUSION ACT

U. S. Officers Take Local Orientals in Custody and it is Believed Chinamen are Guilty of Illegal Residence.

United States immigration officers were in Calumet last evening and effected the arrests of three Chinamen, who are believed to have been brought into the upper peninsula since the passage of the Chinese exclusion act. The Chinamen were taken from the Willie Lee laundry, near the Mineral Range depot. Each asserted that he has his "choc tee" which is a certificate of residence, and in effect previous to the Chinese exclusion act. These "choc tees," according to the Chinamen are in Minneapolis, deposited with friends.

The Chinese statements are to be investigated and in the meantime they are held in the Houghton county jail. Under Sheriff Phil Sheridan and Marshal Trudell of Red Jacket were present at the arrest of the Calumet Chinamen.

The local arrests, it is believed, are the result of the arrest last week of Felix Wagner of the Soo. It is believed that Wagner has been responsible for the smuggling into the U. S. of many Chinamen since the exclusion act went into effect.

The arrest of the Chinamen in Red Jacket last evening caused quite little consternation in Calumet's Chinatown, and has placed the local Orientals on the alert. It is likely that while in the copper country other cases will be investigated by the U. S. officers.

One of the three men arrested last evening has a wife in Calumet, the only Chinese woman, it is believed, in the copper country.

The three Orientals talked under arrest here can all talk a little English. They were dressed in American fashion and all being minus their guns. Provided the charges of smuggling can be proved, the Orientals will have to go back to the land of "chop-ney and rice."

USED PROFANE LANGUAGE.

Jacob Rompainen of the Mayflower location, was brought before Justice Jackola this morning, charged with using profane language in the presence of women. The arrest was made by Deputy Sheriff Nordstrom of that location. Rompainen pleaded guilty and was assessed \$10 and costs. The alternative is thirty days in the county jail. Rompainen is endeavoring to get the money.

WILL ATTEND CEREMONIAL.

A number of Calumet members of Al Sirat temple, of the Dokays, will make arrangements to attend the ceremonial session to be held in Detroit on January 27. There are about 60 members of Al Sirat temple in Calumet, and a large number anticipate being in attendance. The matter will be taken up with the South Shore officials in order to secure special rates, sleeper accommodations, etc.

Members of Hecla lodge, I. O. O. F., are making arrangements to celebrate the 25th anniversary of the organization of the lodge, which occurs in January. The celebration will likely take place in the lodge room on Wednesday evening, January 26. Appropriate exercises will mark the ceremonies.
