FORMER OLD RESIDENT OF KEWEENAW COUNTY DEAD

Mrs. Margaret Foley, wife of Capt. James P. Foley, died Friday afternoon at 4 o'clock, says the Neegaunee department of the Mining Journal.

The deceased was one of the first white women to locate in the copper peninsula, she having settled at Copper Harbor, together with her father, Jerry Finnigan, and other members of the family, in 1847, having gone there direct from Castlemaine, Kerry county, Ireland, where she was born early in January, 1828.

The announcement of the demise of Mrs. Foley will be received with sorrow by friends and acquaintances outside of her home city, as well as by the many here to whom she had endeared herself. Besides the husband she is survived by one son, David P. Foley, of Virginia, Minn., and one daughter, Mrs. Thomas Atkinson, of California.

Mr. Foley requests that friends do not send flowers, this wish having been expressed by the deceased.

LARGE NUMBER OF FINNISH PEOPLE ARE FLOCKING HERE

Big Exodus of Finns in Progress Owing to Russian Aggression in Finland—Large Parties of Immigrants Coming.

If the immigration agents of the Duluth railroads have correct information upon the subject, Russian aggression in Finland is driving a large number of Finns to this country.

There are many Finns coming to the copper country, Duluth and the ranges at the present time, according to the statements made by immigration agents. Many of these men are finding employment in the lumber camps and many more are living with friends and relatives, who have advanced money for the trip to the United States.

The state railroad, according to the information received here, has been reduced in efficiency and the number of employees cut down, because of the taking over of this property by the Russian government.

It is believed by immigration men that the coming spring will witness a large exodus of Finns laborers from the land that is being ruled with an iron hand by Russia. Letters are being written to friends for aid in leaving the country. There is a large prepaid business at the present time testifying to the fact that many of these requests for aid are being met with hearty response. It is stated that with the coming of spring the exodus of laborers from Finland will be even greater than now.

AT ODDS WITH HENEY.



Wm. H. Crocker, millionaire banker, sued by Henny.

New York, Dec. 28.—The libel suit filed last week by Francis T. Henny, of San Francisco graft prosecution fame, against William H. Crocker is attracting unusual attention because of the prominence of the men involved.

Crocker's charges, upon which the libel suit is based, were made in answer to an editorial which appeared in the New York Post, in which he was characterized as "one of the rich men of San Francisco who were willing to back Henny just so long as he confined his operations to the small fry, but undertook to try Patrick Calhoun and announced his intention of prosecuting respectable men higher up."

The letter which Crocker wrote in reply expressed satisfaction over the defeat of Henny in the election and arraigned the members and methods of the graft prosecution in stinging terms.

SKI JUMP WILL BE BUILT ON THE SWEDETOWN HILL

Local Club Will Re-organize for Season and New Hill Provided if Permission of the C. & H. Can be Obtained.

At a meeting of those interested in a ski club for Calumet, held last evening, it was decided to organize for the coming year, and a ski platform and other matters pertaining to a ski hill are to be discussed in the near future.

It was decided to erect the ski jump on the Swedetown hill, provided the C. & H. Mining company is willing to grant permission. Filling to secure the Swedetown hill, the club will make its headquarters at the old stand at Florida. Some of the members are in favor of the Florida hill for ski jumping purposes in preference to the Swedetown hill because of its close proximity to Laurium. The majority, however, favor Swedetown, and provided permission can be obtained from the mining company that hill will serve the club for the season 1910.

It is proposed to hold a ski jumping competition on Washington's birthday, February 22, and also to arrange for a race on skis, probably as far as the Franklin location and return. This is twelve or fourteen miles on skis, and is considered an excellent test of the runners' merits. Suitable prizes are to be offered. New members will join the newly organized club, and it promises to be much stronger this season than last. Ski riding and jumping is becoming a very popular pastime locally.

The members are arranging for a gathering of club members to be held some Sunday in the near future. A long tramp is planned, and it is hoped that as many as possible will be in attendance. Several of the members have already been for ski runs, but none of these have been on an organized basis.

CALUMET CURLERS OPEN SEASON AT THE PALESTRA

The curling season has opened in Calumet. Lovers of the "stones" lost no time in resuming the popular winter sport after the passing of the holiday rush and Christmas morning a good game was played between two local teams at the palestra. Since then business has been indulged in frequently and the game has become as absorbing as at mid-season.

Negotiations are now under way for a number to be played between the Portage Lake curlers, headed by J. D. Edwards of Dollar Bay, and one of the local links. The game will be played at the palestra and will take place on Friday or Saturday. The old-time rivalry between the Portage Lake and Calumet curlers is again manifest and it is expected that a series of interesting games will be played.

Calumet curlers have not yet given the matter of entering a rink in the big bonspiel at the Soc or Duluth consideration. It is possible, however, that the pressure of business will prevent the "broom wielders" from competing for the prizes offered at both big meets. It may be that the Portage Lake and Calumet curlers will combine, sending one team to Duluth.

MANY CLAIM BOUNTY.

Sparrow hunting has become a popular and profitable diversion for the boys of Laurium. Each day a large number of sparrows are presented to the village clerk for the bounty provided by the state and it may be safely stated that since the opening of the Christmas vacation the number of birds killed is twice as large as previous to that time.

Traps are very popular with the boys, air rifles and sling shots being under the ban of village ordinance. However, some of the youngsters have not been as careful in obeying this ordinance as should be the case and some of the residents assert that these weapons are still in use.
