COMMITTEE TO VISIT THE M. C. M.

CASE COMES BACK.

Supreme Court Reverses Decision in Boyer-Joyal Action.

County Clerk Kalsers has received from the state supreme court a notice of the revision of the verdict in the case of Robert Boyer, plaintiff and appellant, versus August Joyal, defendant, a suit for \$4,000 damages

which was commenced by Boyer, December 16, 1909. The Houghton county circuit court rendered a verdict in favor of Joyal at the last May term of court and this has just been reversed in favor of Boyer.

According to the description in the plea in the county clerk's office, the suit is for payment of the "board, clothes, maintenance, education and care of Parmita Joyal by request of August Joyal, from July 1890 to April 1909."

Attorney Legris of Houghton is handling the case for the defendant, while Attorneys O'Brien & Legendre of Calumet are pressing the suit for the plaintiff.

It appears that both parties are residents of Lake Linden and that on the death of Joyal's wife, Boyer took the little child, only a few hours old, and brought it to his home where he and his wife cared for the girl until she was nineteen years of age.

It is alleged that Joyal then claimed his daughter. The plaintiff demands compensation for the care of the child up to the time it was taken away from him.

"The prison ship is not a thing of the past," says a letter from Germany, "but the one which I have discovered has no resemblance to the Jersey of revolutionary times, where American patriots suffered martyrdom. This one is maintained by the city of Luneberg. There are usually from 20 to 40 offenders of the minor class confined there. At night they are locked in cells, and in the daytime they work under overseers on the dikes. The ship looks like one of our American canal boats, and the interior, while it contains no fancy furniture or decorative features, is light and well ventilated and probably more comfortable than the habitations which the inmates call home.

The power plant of a boat can be increased or reduced to suit the desires of the owner, but once the shape and size of the hull have been decided upon, changes of this nature are not easily made. Consequently, the "lines" of the boat become really of foremost importance in a consideration of speed. The best designed hull for any practical purpose is that which is sufficiently large and heavy to carry the load intended for it, is seaworthy, and yet one that will travel over the water and will make as little wave and disturbance as possible.

A boat which "pulls the whole river behind her" is either overpowered and is being forced through the water at an uneconomical speed, or she is poorly designed and her lines offer a greater resistance than should be the case.

Although many boats are designed to "draw down" at the stern when under way, this characteristic should not be carried too far, as an undue drag is then formed by the after half of the hull. The once popular canoe model of speed boat gave way to the torpedo stern, and this in turn has been replaced by the moderately wide hull with the "V-transom" stern, a design well adapted for almost any purpose, from a small, one-man "run about" to a racer or a large cruiser.

This model raises slightly at the bow at the higher speeds, but the underside of the stern is flattened so that the submerged portion is pushed over the surface of the water rather than through it.—Outing.
