HOLIDAYS FOR SWISS GUARD.

Great excitement has been caused at the Vatican by the desertion of twenty soldiers of the Swiss guards as a protest against the reforms introduced by the new commandant, Col. Jules Repond.

Col. Repond's idea is that the papal army should be real soldiers, subject to military discipline, and not merely ornamental persons. The deserters have presented an ultimatum to the Pope demanding three days' holiday each week, and declaring that the whole regiment will desert if this demand is not granted. The Pope has refused to grant the demand, and may in consequence find himself without an army.—Rome Corr. London Express.

ALL READY FOR NIGHT SCHOOL

Board of Education Approves of Plan. School to Open Tuesday

At the regular meeting of the board of education held last evening it was voted to maintain a night school during the coming fall and winter for a period of thirty weeks. Sessions are to be held in the high school building on Tuesday and Friday evenings of each week, beginning at 7:30 o'clock and closing at 9:30 o'clock. Classes will be conducted in the following subjects: book-keeping and arithmetic, advanced arithmetic, elementary work, ungraded school work, English composition and grammar, stenography and typewriting, mechanical drawing, and beginners algebra. Because of the small number of application for solid geometry and machine shop work, no classes will be conducted in these subjects.

The first session of the night school will be held next Tuesday evening, October 15th. All persons who have enrolled in any of the above named classes, or who desire to take work in any of these classes should report at the high school assembly room at 7:30 o'clock. At this time the school will be organized and persons will be assigned to their respective rooms and teachers. The necessary list and cost of text-books will also be given.

It was also voted to admit students from the neighboring districts provided they, as individuals, pay the tuition, or provided the board of education of their respective districts pay the tuition.

It is hoped that all who expect to take the work will be in attendance at the first session. Teachers for the various classes will be named in the near future and it is planned to have everything ready at the opening session.

SPECIAL MEETING OF THE COUNCIL THIS AFTERNOON

TO AUTHORIZE THE RETIREMENT OF ONE OF THE MUNICIPAL BONDS.

There will be a special meeting of the Red Jacket council this afternoon to authorize the retirement of one of the village bonds. This is made possible by the fact that Oscar Keckonen yesterday placed to the credit of the village the \$10,000 consideration involved in the recent sale of the old fire hall property on Fifth street, for which Mr. Keckonen was the highest bidder at public auction. It is likely that the council will also consider plans for the construction of a sheet iron shed, covering the entire lot purchased from the C. & H. mining company a few years ago, and which is located on Seventh street. Work on this building probably will be started at once so that it may be made ready to house the village's equipment of wagons etc., which have heretofore been kept in the old fire hall.

By the retiring of the above mentioned bond, the council will save interest amounting to about \$450 annually, also the final payment of the bond when it falls due.

Many to Houghton.

Calumet will be well represented at the Roosevelt meeting in Houghton this evening. The 300 reserved seats allotted to this city have proved insufficient to meet the demands which have been made upon the Progressive leaders, and many local people will find it necessary to take chances on securing seats. The Copper Range road will run three special trains to Houghton this afternoon and evening, one leaving at 5:45, another at 6:00 and the last at 7. This train will also stop at Laurium. The Mineral Range road will also run a special train leaving Calumet at 7 o'clock and stopping at Onseola and Arcadian. Returning both the Copper Range and Mineral Range trains will leave Houghton at 11 o'clock.

FIRST RALLY OF THE G. O. P. MEN

Republicans to Hold Big Meeting Tomorrow Evening

The Republican campaign will be formally opened at the Light Guard armory tomorrow evening, with a rally at which half a dozen of the foremost orators engaged in the present campaign will speak, some of them being men of national prominence and others in the limelight in state affairs.

The meeting, following as close upon the Roosevelt meeting at Houghton tonight, is one of the three big gatherings in the copper country, planned to checkmate the effect of Roosevelt's visit. The other gatherings will be held in Houghton and Mohawk. The principal speakers at all of the rallies will be J. Adam Bede of Minnesota, Col. A. C. Rankin, and John M. Harlan, speakers who have trailed Roosevelt and delivered speeches in every town the expedition visited in the west. Others in the party are Hon. Dunan E. McKinley of California, H. Olin Young, representative in Congress from the Twelfth Michigan district, Amos S. Musselman, the Republican candidate for governor, and Alex. J. Grosbeck, chairman of the state central committee.
