WILL DONATE TO FUND.

Salvation Army Corps to Aid in Booth Memorials Project.

At the regular services of the local Salvation Army last evening, Adjutant Jackson stated that the Salvation Army in this country was going to make an effort to raise \$500,000 to be used as a fund for the erection of perpetual memorials to the memory of the late General Booth, the founder of the Army.

Adjutant Jackson said the Calumet branch will be called upon to do its share. It is the intention to build two training colleges in this country, one in Chicago and the other in New York, for the purpose of training men and women desirous of entering the work of the Army.

To assist the cause of raising this money, the local Army is making arrangements to give a "memorial" entertainment in the Army hall on Saturday, Nov. 2. The plans for the entertainment have not all been worked out as yet, but something novel is promised. It is expected that each branch of the Army in this country will be called upon to subscribe pro rata to its membership and size of population. It is believed the "memorial" fund will be well patronized in Calumet.

MUSIC LOVERS ARE AROUSED

Coming of Sousa's Band Tomorrow Big Event

"The people of Calumet should account it a rare privilege to hear John Phillip Sousa and his famous band," said a well-known local musician today. "Musicians admit that Sousa's band is the greatest in America, and many contend it is the greatest in the world. There is but one Sousa's band, and a Sousa concert always means the hearing of the finest players and soloists that the highest salaries can command. When it is announced that this unequalled organization will be here tomorrow, matinee and night, with Miss Virginia Roe, soprano; Miss Nicoline Zedeler, violinist; and Herbert L. Clarke, cornetist, as soloists, it is an assurance that the people in this city may expect to hear the same class of entertainment that has made the name of Sousa so famous throughout the world.

It is interesting to Calumet people to note that this city has been given a prominent place on the map of Sousa's world tour, which is used extensively in the billboard advertising, and which cannot help but reflect to Calumet's credit. Houghton, Hancock, Marquette and other upper peninsula towns are not included on this map, but Calumet is given fully as much prominence as the larger cities of the country.

MANY FARMERS VIEW EXHIBITS

Demonstration and Lectures by M. A. C. Experts

About four hundred adults and as many more students of the graded schools and high school of Calumet, were received and entertained on the South Shore "Cloverland" agricultural special in the railroad yards this morning. The train, which has been sent through the upper peninsula by the D., S. & A. road for educational purposes only, to show the farmers up to date methods and to interest others who are not already impressed with the agricultural possibilities of this district, is in charge of Prof. Henry W. Geiler, the South Shore Agriculturalist and E. W. MacPherran of Duluth, Land Commissioner. It consists of seven cars, one diner, one sleeper, two lecture cars and three cars filled with exhibits.

Lectures were given this morning by Prof. J. A. Jeffery, Prof. W. F. Raven, Prof. O. J. Linton, all of the staff of the state agricultural college at Lansing and by E. G. Carr and Prof. Leo M. Geismar, the latter in charge of the upper peninsula experimental station at Chatham. The lectures were practical talks on practical subjects.

Local farmers asked many questions relative to soil, crops, live stock and feed and all who did so were placed on the mailing list for the periodical bulletins of the M. A. C. on timely subjects.

The exhibits are very interesting. In the live stock car were found dairy cows of the Jersey, Holstein and Short Horn, Aberdeen and white faced Hereford varieties, a Berkshire hog weighing 700 pounds and other hogs of the Poland China and Duro Jersey types, Ramboulette Hampshire and Shropshire sheep were also on exhibition.

In the poultry coops were found the following varieties: Barred Rocks, Wyandottes, White and Brown Single Combed Leghorns, Rhode Island Reds and Buff Rocks.

In the demonstration car are found the chemical department, where tests of soil are made, also a practical illustration of the amount of water required for various crops, samples indicating the correct and incorrect method of plowing and harrowing the soil, a collection of up-to-date agricultural implements and exhibits of wheat, barley and oats grown at the upper peninsula experimental farm at Chatham. One novel exhibit is that showing the value of selecting good seed. It pans where the soil is identical and situated side by side were planted fifty kernels each of indifferent and good seed. Although planted at the same time, the latter has far outstripped the former in growth and general healthy appearance. In selecting the good seed the lighter seed and chaff had been removed as well as the under-sized kernels.

The exhibits, taken as a whole, are not exceptional, they having been selected fairly from average crops. The live stock chosen is no better than that seen in several upper peninsula farms, but is exhibited to interest the farmers in blooded stock, which experience has proved to be more profitable than mongrel stock.

The South Shore agricultural train is a success. It fills a long felt want and has aroused the farmers of this district to an ambition for better things. Those in charge of this year's exhibit anticipate that a more extended campaign of education will be necessary next year.
