EARLY SEASON HURTS HUNTING

Deer in Danger of Extermination Says MacDonald

"One noticeable feature of the present hunting season is the large number of does and fawns being killed," said Game Warden John T. MacDonald this morning. "I find that practically all of the deer shipped in so far this season are either female or young deer, and if this continues much longer, the extermination of the species is certain."

Mr. MacDonald attributes this to the early opening of the season. The fawn invariably runs with the doe during the early part of the year and the mother instinct of the latter causes it to take undue chances, when hunted, in order to protect its young. Few bucks are being shot by the hunters, according to Mr. MacDonald.

The woods are full of hunters, according to the game warden. Some are hunting partridge, some rabbits and some deer and the presence of the dogs of the first mentioned hunters adds to the confusion. Although it is unlawful to train dogs on a deer, there is no way to prevent bird and rabbit hunters from using dogs, and frequently they quit the small game and go after the big.

Mr. MacDonald anticipates that his troubles will be augmented after Jan. 1, when protection will be removed from beaver. There are numerous provisions of the law covering the trapping of beaver, which hunters and trappers must live up to if they wish to avoid trouble.

WILLARD MACK'S TROUBLES.

Maudie Leone Files Petition For Divorce From Actor.

Copper country people who remember the Mack-Leone stock company which frequently has appeared here will read with interest the following from the Duluth Herald, concerning the matrimonial troubles of the principals of that company.

"With a new wife on his hands and a mother-in-law who recently charged that he threatened to kill her, Actor Willard Mack's troubles were further increased by the filing in Omaha of a divorce petition Friday afternoon by Mrs. Maudie McLaughlin, better known as Maudie Leone, actress.

Mack, or Charles W. McLaughlin, as he is known on the stage, is charged with being a habitual drunkard and a drug fiend by Maudie Leone, who says he has also been guilty of extreme cruelty without using personal violence.

"She says that Mack's conduct, in drinking and swearing at her for more than two years past has been such as to endanger her health and at times almost unfitted her in a measure to carry out her work as an actress and leading woman in her chosen profession. She expresses fears that he will carry out threats to injure her in her person and reputation.

"They were married at Cedar Rapids, Iowa, in 1902. The petition filed Friday afternoon makes no reference to the sensational incidents at Salt Lake City, where Mack recently became involved in difficulties with his new mother-in-law and the question of whether he had ever been legally divorced occupied the attention of a public official.

TOMORROW IS TAG DAY OF THE SALVATION ARMY

ADJUTANT JACKSON AND LOCAL CORPS ASSIST IN MOVEMENT FOR MEMORIAL

Tomorrow is the Salvation Army tag day and Adjutant Jackson and members of the local corps will do their utmost to raise funds to assist in the movement for a National memorial for General Booth. Members will be posted in prominent places about town to receive contributions.

The day has been designated by Commander Evangeline C. Booth, daughter of the late general, and the Salvation Army will have charge of the collection of the funds.

It is the aim of the organization to erect a lasting memorial to the memory of their departed leader, by carrying into execution his project for founding a great "University of Humanity." The first step will be a series of "training colleges," and to this end the proceeds of tag day will be devoted.

The committee in charge estimate that \$550,000 will be needed to start the project. Instead of appealing to the wealthy classes for this amount, however, it is their aim to collect it in small amounts from the public at large, in whose interests the schools are to be established.

Five million people will be asked to contribute 10 cents each to the enterprise, and the balance of the fund will be made up by larger sums.

"We can conceive of nothing that is likely to bear a better fruitage in improving conditions by improving men than a college given up to the solution of moral and economic problems, showing its students how to apply its findings to the conditions of everyday life in the neediest quarters of the city," say the committee in their appeal.

General Booth was a master in this realm, and the purpose to perpetuate his memory by providing for such an institution as the one referred to seems to be peculiarly fitting. Look out for the tag and have your gift ready."

Women and the Ballot.

Rev. Luther K. Long, pastor of the Calumet Congregational church, spoke to an interested congregation last evening on the questions, "Should the ballot be given to women?" and "What are they likely to do with it when they get it?"

He began by stating his position in favor of equal suffrage and continued as follows:

"Women should have the ballot because they are human beings as much as men. The question of government and suffrage are not primarily sex questions but human problems. Women need the ballot for their protection as much as men do, and more. A man cannot protect himself merely by his physical power, neither can a woman.

"Women have children whose lives and interests are dearer to them than their own, and who in the complexities of modern social and industrial life can secure their rights only when their mothers and female friends have the ballot. Women are in the labor market, and need the ballot in precisely the same way that men do, in order to protect themselves under modern conditions.

"As to what they are likely to do with the ballot when they get it, I am not asking them that question. They might think it an impertinent question, and properly enough reply, 'It is none of your business!'

"I think it quite likely that women in large numbers will use the ballot to further the following great interests, besides many other things that very naturally come up:

"1.—To secure better conditions for working women. There are thousands of these married and unmarried, wages, houses, conditions, physical and moral, are often very unsatisfactory. These women laborers will be joined by many other women whose lot in life is easier, and readjustments will be made so that the lives and bodies and virtues of all women will be more secure.

"2.—To secure better conditions for the children. It is unfair to the children, that women either during the child-bearing period, or while but young girls, are required to unduly tax their strength in shops, mills and offices. It is unfair to the children that they themselves be required to work when they ought to be at play, or in school, or in their beds.

"3.—To secure better conditions for men. They will aid in providing for certain men as the colored woman said her husband did for her. When asked after she had been married a few weeks her husband was a good provider, replied: 'Land sake, yes, he done provided me three new pieces to wash already.' But women will also act specifically in remedying a condition that is a reproach to an industrial organization. There is always a multitude of men unemployed. There are always women overworked. There are
