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### START REPAIRS ON GAS PLANT

**Old Retort Burnt Out and New Is Being Built**

The Gas Machinery company of Cleveland has a force of men at work on repairs at the Calumet Gas company's plant in Florida location. The old retort, which has been in use for about three years, was burnt out and a new retort is being installed. This is the part of the plant in which the coal is baked and because of the necessity of its being out of commission a combination of coal and water gas is being supplied to consumers, although it costs more to manufacture this kind of gas than plain coal gas. It is estimated that it will require until about the middle of January for the repairing and improvements to be completed.
