WANT CHANGES IN LAW.

Michigan Sportsmen Urge Game and Fish Commission.

Undoubtedly the failure in the last legislature the Michigan Sportsmen's association, of which State Tax Commissioner W. B. Morrison, of Sault Ste. Marie, is president, is in a planning position for the protection, propagation and conservation of fish, birds and game before the incoming legislature. W. A. Tatum, of Grand Rapids, who is an expert in the state legislature in charge of the work, as secretary. It is the plan to hold meetings in fifty counties of the state within a short time. A change which the association wants is the consolidation of the fish commission and game wardens' departments into a new department of five members, to be non-partisan and non-renewable. This board

would appoint the game warden, and have the power of the present fish commission. Preparation of game laws such as quail, pheasant and duck would be fostered. The association would have small tracts of state land set aside for preserves for these birds. Another measure recommended is the hunters license fee at \$1 for a Michigan resident and \$10 for non-residents.

NO TURKEY; NO COOK STOVES

Two Calumet Families in Dir Need Says Charities Appeal

While Calumet people are preparing to load their tables with reasonable good things always associated with Thanksgiving, the Associated Charities calls attention to the needs of two families, who besides having to go without turkey tomorrow, will have to go without anything else that is warm and freshly cooked, for they are without cook stoves. Discussing the situation today, the secretary said:

"There surely must be some family in Calumet with two cook stoves and who would be willing to part with one to do an act of charity, or there must be someone more fortunate who is willing to purchase stoves to supply the want. And it is real want. It certainly will be a cheerless Thanksgiving for them unless some kind hearted soul comes to the rescue."

One of the stoves is wanted for a woman with three children, whose husband and father is a patient in the state hospital at Newberry. Try as she will, the poor woman is barely able to earn enough to keep the family clothed and provide food and she is wholly unable to purchase a stove. The stove she is now using has outlived its usefulness and is beyond repair. It wastes fuel so rapidly that the Associated Charities does not feel warranted in providing more fuel until a more serviceable stove is secured. At present it serves as a heating as well as cooking stove. The Associated Charities secretary states that the troubles of the family will be greatly reduced if this stove is forthcoming.

The second stove is wanted for a woman and one child, deserted by the husband and father soon after their arrival in America from a foreign country. The furniture of this poor woman's home consists entirely of a worn out laundry stove, not adapted in any way to cooking, a kitchen table and about three chairs besides a small bed. The need is almost as great as in the case first mentioned, as the unfortunate woman does her best to provide for herself and child and the addition of a cooking stove would be greatly appreciated.
