TO AMEND NEW LIABILITY ACT

Author of Bill Admits it is Far From Perfect

Plans to amend the workmen's compensation act, passed at the last special session of the legislature, will be considered at the coming conference of employers and employees, labor, civic, reform and other organizations and individuals, in Lansing, December 10-14.

Senator W. Frank James of Hancock, one of the staunchest supporters of the measure, plans to introduce an amendment which aims to make the compensation for injured employees take effect sooner than is now provided for. At present the compensation does not take effect until two weeks after the accident and unless the injured employee is incapacitated for more than sixty days, the compensation does not cover the entire period, dating from the first day. It is understood that Senator James will ask the legislature to make the compensation take effect after the seventh day, and to grant compensation for the full time, including the first seven days, if the employee is incapacitated beyond thirty days. It is believed this will make the act cover minor accidents and at the same time will protect the employer against fraud.

"The bill naturally wasn't perfect," said Representative Noble Ashley of Detroit, the author of the measure, in discussing the need of revision this week. "It was, in part, a result of compromise and, as is often the case, there are certain points in the measure that give rise to disputes."

"I expect several amendments will be submitted. In section two the statute says: 'If an employee is injured by reason of his intentional and willful misconduct, he shall not receive compensation.' This section defines nothing. The employer need have no limit on rules. He can make any number and all kinds. Their violation might have no bearing on liability for accident, and yet breaking them might give grounds for the employer's argument that the employee broke a rule and got hurt. Therefore, he was guilty of misconduct. I believe this feature should be amended in some way so that more explicit lines are drawn."

"The question of the application of the law to a man while on his way to or from a job to which he has been sent by his employer also needs clarification. It can be settled one way or another in definite language. The law now provides that compensation must be paid for every case of injury arising out of, and in the course of, employment. There are a number of situations that could be argued into or out of this provision."

Major General Phillips of Owosso To Explain Pictures of Soldiers.

Considerable local interest is manifested in the appearance at the Peoples' theater of Laurium Friday and Saturday of this week, of the military "movies," showing views of the life of the national guardsmen from this state in camp at Ludington this summer. There will be three exhibitions of the pictures, commencing at 7:15 on Friday and Saturday evenings and also a matinee at 2:30 on Saturday. The
