WICKERSHAM GOES AFTER ADDING MACHINE "TRUST"

Detroit, Mich., March 4.—A civil suit filed here yesterday by order of Judge General Wickersham, charging the Burroughs Adding Machine company with monopolizing interstate and foreign trade in adding machines and appliances was followed immediately by the entry of an agreed decree terminating alleged unfair practices to stifle competition.

The \$5,000,000 company was ordered to furnish its agents in writing to detail from interfering with competitors and is forbidden to acquire a controlling interest in any competing concern without the consent of the court.

The company was accused of acquiring and suppressing the Universal and Pile Adding Machine companies and of attempting to acquire and suppress the Addograph Manufacturing and the Addo Machine companies. It is alleged that defendants have maintained a system of suppressing competition by offering rebates to dealers who agreed to sell only their machines.
