BELIEVES GLASS CAUSE OF FIRES

Would Conserve Forests by Ending Time-Worn Custom

In its efforts to reduce the excessive waste due to forest fires, the federal forestry department is endeavoring to prevent the throwing of bottles into underbrush, believing that broken glass devastated of valuable timber are intensely materialized, are the cause of many such fires. Owners of tracts of land that is in constant danger of being devastated of valuable timber are interested in developments. In this connection the following Washington, D. C. dispatch will be of interest:

James McC. Smith of St. Paul, who is the owner of extensive tracts of wooded land in several of the northwestern states, believes that the forestry bureau is now inaugurating a campaign which will materially reduce this destruction. In discussing the project at the Raleigh, Mr. Smith said:

"The agents of the forestry service, I am told, have been instructed to bend their efforts to prevent the throwing of bottles into underbrush or along the roads or trails leading through forest country. The inspectors are convinced that many of these fires for which they cannot account are started by the focusing of the sun's rays upon bottles or broken glass, which act as a 'burning glass,' igniting dry leaves or grass."

"In practically every lumbering camp there are men who are fond of their drink and they are careless when they throw their discarded flasks or beer bottles. This heavy glass, cast into a bundle of dry leaves, will catch the rays of the sun and start a fire just as John Smith, I believe it was, started one for the Indians with his pocket magnifying glass."

"An inspector once told me that while walking along a wooded trail he saw a thin curl of smoke arising from leaves nearby. He went to the spot, he said, and looked carefully, but could see no cause for the fire. As he was in the act of stamping it out, he added, he discovered the bottom of a beer bottle lying on the leaves, upon which the sun was playing its rays."

"This may appear to be a trivial order for the forestry service to issue, but if it is true that fires are caused, it may mean the prevention of much destruction and a real step toward conservation."

HIS JOB POOR PAYING.

Man Doubts Ability to Pay Five Dollars Monthly to Wife.

Arrested on a charge of non-support, preferred by his wife, Mrs. Minnie Palminti, Michael Palminti, who admits he is seventy years of age and appears to be even older, this morning expressed some doubt to Justice William Fisher of his ability to contribute so small an amount as five dollars per month towards his wife's maintenance. He was ordered to try, however, sentence being deferred for thirty days so that he might make the effort.

Palminti is a scissor grinder, and is a familiar figure about the streets of this city, having resided here practically all his life. His wife has some ability as a nurse and is able to provide for some of her own wants, and she has grown children who help her. However, she expressed the belief that her husband should contribute, even if only to the extent of spending money. Palminti informed the court that business has been poor this winter. His call of "scissors to grind" has met with a poor response and as a result his earnings do not total over thirty dollars a month. In the summer, when there are "umbrellas to mend" things seem a trifle brighter and Palminti thought he might be able to contribute then. The court and prosecuting attorney thought he might do a little something now, however, and gave him the chance.

IS OVERCOME BY GAS.

Miner's Rescue System in Operation for the First Time Here.

For almost the first time since the miner's rescue station was installed in Calumet by G. W. Hawes about two years ago, practical use was made of the equipment today to revive Charles Sammuty, an employee of the water-lower department who had the misfortune to be overcome by gas while engaged in cleaning out a gasoline reservoir tank about 10 o'clock this morning.

It seems that Sammuty, after dipping considerable of the gasoline out of the tank, through a small opening in the top, decided he could work more effectively from within and crawled immediately under the opening. He was almost immediately overcome and some difficulty was experienced in getting him out through the small opening into the fresh air. A man named Johnson, who was assisting Sammuty, also went into the tank in an effort to get the latter out, and he likewise was overcome, but not to the same extent.

Sammuty was removed to the C. & H. hospital where the pulmotor oxygen helmet was placed on him and after considerable work he was revived, suffering no ill effects from the experience or the treatment.

OLD RESIDENT PASSES AWAY

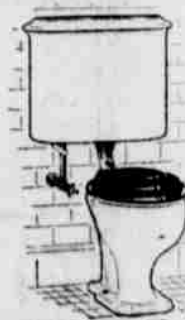
