## In its efforts to reduce the exces ve waste due to forest fires, the federal forestry department is endeavor ng to prevent the throwing of bottles

**BELIEVES GLASS** 

Would Conserve Forests by End-

ing Time-Worn Custom

Owners of tracts of and that is in constant danger of being devastated of valueble timber ar interested in developments. In this connection the following Washington C., dispatch will be of interest:

James McC. Smith of St. Paul, who the owner of extensive tracts of coded land in several of the northvestern states, believes that the forestry bureau is now inaugurating a cam aign which will materially reduce this estruction. In discussing the project t the Raleigh, Mr. Smith said:

The agents of the forestry service am told, have been instructed to end their efforts to prevent the throwing of bottles into underbrush or long the roads or trails leading brough forest country. The inspec ors are convinced that many of these ares for which they cannot account are started by the focusing of the sun's rays upon bottles or broken glass which act as a "burning glass," ignitng dry leaves or grass.

"In practically every, lumbering amp there are men who are fond of heir drink and they are carcless where hey throw their discarded flasks of per bottles. This heavy glass, cast nto a bandle of dry leaves, will catch he rays of the sun and start a fire ist as John Smith, I believe it was, darted one for the Indians with his nelect magnifying glass.

"An inspector once told me that while walking along a wooded trait he aw a thin curl of smoke arising from leaves nearby. He went to the spot, he said, and looked carefully, but could see no cause for the fire. As he was in the act of stamping it out, he added, he discovered the bottom of a beer bottle lying on the leaves, upon which the sun was playing its rays.

"This may appear to be a trivial rder for the forestry service to issue but if it is true that fires are so caused. it may mean the prevention of much destruction and a real step toward conservation."
