## \$3.42 FOR EACH NAME ENROLLED

Light Registration Makes Proportionate Cost Heavy

The registration of voters in Calumet township Saturday, cost the township at a rate of \$3.42 for each name enrolled. This heavy proportionate cost was due to the light registration, only seventy-nine new names having been registered in the various precincts of the township. In addition however there were several transfers in almost all of the precincts, some due to removals from the city or to another precinct and others to the death of voters.

Towship Clerk George Martin estimates the cost of the registration, including the money paid to clerks, precinct rentals, advertising, printing and incidental expenses at \$270. This being the case the cost of each new name registered is as above given.

The principal reason for the light registration is believed to be the heavy registration last fall before the general election, which left practically the entire voting strength of the town registered.

### TO HOLD CIVIL SERVICE EXAMINATIONS APRIL 23

Test For Electrician Will Be Held at Calumet Postoffice.

A competitive examination for electrician is announced by the Civil Service commission to be held at the Calumet postoffice April 23. The position, bearing a salary of \$900, is in the civilian service at Detroit. The commission urges that qualified persons enter the examination as much difficulty has been experienced in securing eligibles for the position.

Competitors will be examined in the following subjects:

Report writing (test in writing in letter form a report not more than 200 words in length summarizing and arranging in logical order a series of facts included in a given statement of ten or 500 words), practical questions, and training as to training, experience and fitness are accepted subject to verification.

Applicants must be between 18 and 35 years of age. All honorably discharged soldiers and sailors of the War of the Rebellion, and persons honorably discharged from the military or naval service of the United States by reason of disability incurred in the line of duty, will be admitted to this examination without regard to the age limits.

Persons who have suffered the loss of an arm or a leg, who are captured, or who have other serious disability, are considered physically disqualified for this position.

This examination is open to all men who are citizens of or owe allegiance to the United States and who meet the requirements.

### TO LOCATE ON FARM.

Referring to the invitation now running in your local paper for proposals to sell property for the federal building site to be acquired in your city, you are advised that, while the department's circular of information respecting site acquisition states that no special form of proposal is required or provided, so many calls for a form of proposal have been received that it is deemed wise to provide a suitable blank. Accordingly, I transmit herewith a number of copies of the form which has been prepared. Please distribute the same in pairs to such persons as may wish to submit proposals for the sale of property for the federal building site.

Should it be found that some proposals have already prepared their proposals, please advise them that they may submit new proposals on the printed forms herewith, or content themselves with the papers they have already prepared or submitted. Bidders are not required to re-submit offers which were prepared before the receipt of the printed form. Of course, those who rewrite their proposals on the new blank will not be required to send in new plans, photographs, etc.
