OPENING LEAGUE CONTEST WON BY HANCOCK HIGHS

SCHOOL CHAMPIONS HAVE LITTLE DIFFICULTY IN WINNING FROM HOUGHTON.

The Hancock high school ball team had little difficulty in defeating the Houghton highs in the opening game of the season yesterday afternoon at Ripley park, the final score of the encounter being 12 to 3. The game was a rugged one in many ways, the Houghton team making 12 errors during the game of which at least six were made on poor work in trying to cut off attempted steals on the part of the Hancock men. Catcher Rogers of Houghton threw poorly, six passes being too high and too fast for his fielders to hold.

Captain Laurel Worthing started on the mound for Houghton but was retired in the seventh in favor of Henry Rogers. All caught the last two innings and played this position well.

Axelson pitched for Hancock and was found freely for hits when there was no one on bases. His support was steady and resulted in but four places, which was wonderful baseball by comparison with the brand put up by Houghton. Houghton rarely earned what runs they did get, by hitting Axelson's delivery hard.

Neither side scored in the first inning, although Gilgespie was caught at the plate, but in the second, Hancock got three runs by hitting Worthing and taking advantage of his wildness. Two bases on balls, a hit batsman and two hits netted three runs and a like number were added an inning later or two passes a hit and two stolen bases.

Hancock's seventh run came when Gilgespie got his third hit and stole a wild pitch sending him home. Houghton scored once in the same inning on a pass to Hollister and on some good base running, while Hancock got another in the fifth on a pass and some errors. In the sixth, Hancock fell on Worthing for four hits and sent three runs across and in the seventh added another on good hitting. Houghton rallied and scored three times in the seventh on hits by Rogers, Alt and Worthing and a pass to Hollister. Both teams pitched the eighth and ninth innings and yielded one run which was made by Shields without the aid of any hitting on some poor fielding by Houghton. In the ninth, Houghton had a good opening when Hollister was passed with none out, but the hidden ball trick got him and Chynoweth's air was wasted when he was thrown out at second.
