TO RETURN ALL CONTRIBUTIONS

Citizens' Relief Committee Makes
Final Report Today

The citizens' relief committee, whose efforts to extend aid to sufferers of the Italian hall Christmas eve disaster met with blunt refusal, through the pleading of President Meyer and other federation leaders, today decided to return all subscriptions that have been received from outside points and to issue a call of ten per cent on all local contributions. This sum, equivalent to \$1,400, will be sufficient to take care of such amounts as the committee was able to extend to a few afflicted families, and to pay for the expense that was incurred by the committee. The remaining ninety per cent will be returned to the donors as soon as the committee concludes its work. In the event that any part of the \$1,400 remains after all bills are paid it will be given to the Associated Charities.

The \$1,400 which was contributed by outside donors, will be returned immediately. This sum, however, does not include a reported \$1,000 offered by Mayor Marx of Detroit as the committee refused to accept any sum from that municipality when it became known that the sufferers would accept no relief from other than union sources. A day or two following the catastrophe, Mayor Marx telegraphed Mayor Schumaker to the effect that the sum of \$1,000 was at the disposal of the committee. A reply was sent immediately conveying an expression of gratitude and explaining that the money could not be accepted.

Apparently this has been misconstrued as the impression has been created in Detroit that the money is still in the hands of the committee. It may be explained that the only check for \$1,000 from Detroit, was sent by the Employers' association of that city. Meanwhile, union leaders of the lower part of the state have been demanding that the Detroit city council reclaim the money that it may be distributed through avenues other than the Citizens' committee of Calumet, on the ground that the committee is composed of members of the Citizens' Alliance.
