A. Hartman, who pleaded guilty to fraudulently aftering a check, was duced on probation for two years. with an order to report to the court each month. He was also ordered to omply with seven rules laid down by ludge O'Brien, who exercised further enlency by permitting the defendant o leave the state.

George Males, charged with assault, was sentenced to twenty days in the ounty jail. Attorney Kerr in behalf of the defendant, told the court that his client has already been confined in the county jail for a period of forty six days and he deemed this a part of a sentence. The court replied that the case has been reviewed and the additional sentence was metted out. Henry Schultz, charged with simple larceny, was given a thirty-day sen-

ence. Vincent Kallse, charged with carry ng concealed weapons, was sentenced to twenty days in the county jail. The defendant offered a statement of a 159 Catholic priest, corroborating that of himself, that he carried a revolver while taking \$50 of the church funds 163 from Paincedale to South Range, Ka-171 lise then was acting treasurer of the 163 church organization.
