FARMERS' MART ONE OF OBJECTS


Local Association Plans Collective Buying and Selling

Some plan whereby the farmers of the copper country district may buy and sell collectively, and have access to a permanent market with the least possibility of fluctuating prices, is an object which will be sought by the recently organized Farmers' Association. It is not unlikely that the farmers will petition the various municipal governments in the copper country to establish a trade mart, where they may meet at stated intervals to buy and sell and where they may come in touch with purchasers directly. This suggestion has already been considered in Houghton, having been brought up by one of the trustees about two years ago, but so far none of the other councils have interested themselves in it.

In addition to some definite arrangement for marketing their produce, the farmers also desire to buy their farm implements and other equipment collectively. Just how this can be done has not yet been figured out but it will be taken up later.

The association whose membership embraces many of the Finnish farmers of this district, was formed a short time ago for the principal purpose of endeavoring to secure more equitable rentals from the various mining companies from whom their lands are leased. Although this matter has not been definitely disposed of, it will be soon.
