## GOOD TALKS AT MASS MEETING

### Fallacies of Socialism Are Pointed Out at Armory

From 500 to 600 Finnish residents of the Calumet district attended the big public mass meeting held in the Light Guard armory yesterday afternoon under the auspices of the Finnish Anti-Socialist League.

President Lempea gave a short talk in which he pointed out the purposes and aims of the league and how it came to be in existence.

The talk of Attorney Galbraith was an interesting one, he pointing out the baneful influence of Socialism, the desire to tear down established institutions of government, law, home, church, business and the rights of capital. Mr. Galbraith touched upon the necessity of having capital in promoting industry of any kind, asserting it is as essential to that business as is the labor of the working man.

Dr. O. H. Sorenson declared that when any community faces as great danger, it organizes to meet and combat that danger. This is the principle on which the Anti-Tuberculosis society is founded and likewise the feeling which is the corner stone of the Anti-Socialist League. The impression prevails he asserted, that a large percentage of the Finns are Socialists. This is not true he declared, only a small percentage having worked in this cause. The Anti-Socialist League is trying to repair the suffering caused by the recent strike and is trying to heal those wounds with love, not with hatred, he declared.

Andrew Bram, county treasurer told of the efforts to mislead the Finnish residents by the Socialists. During the recent industrial trouble, asserted Mr. Bram, the defendants in about sixty per cent of the court cases were Finns, who before the strike and before they had listened to the gospel of discontent and Socialism were hard working, industrious, law abiding and peaceful citizens. This condition may be attributed directly to Socialistic teachings he asserted.

Gustav Hamina, a Wolverine miner, called attention to the necessity of having a dividing line among the Finnish residents, so that one might know whether they were Socialists or not. Referring to the recent strike, Mr. Hamina asserted that the Socialistic leaders must have known as early as January 1 there could be no hope of winning this controversy. Only the desire to promote their own selfish interests prevented them from telling the strikers of this condition and saving them further suffering. Waino Lehto of Wolverine, also a miner, attacked Socialism.

Next Saturday afternoon there will be organized under the auspices of the league a district grange for the farmers in the north end of the district.

#### IN THE JUSTICE COURTS.

##### Zager-Cinchic Case Adjourned by Justice Fisher Until Thursday.

The case of Nicholas Zager and William Cinchic, charged with highway robbery in connection with an alleged hold-up at Copper City about one week ago, was this morning continued by Justice Fisher until Thursday, to provide for the transcription of the testimony.

Don Donahue and Walfrid Johnson were arraigned before Justice Armit today on the charge of being drunk and disorderly. Being unable to pay fines of five dollars and costs, both were sent to the Houghton Jail for a period of thirty days.

Don Murphy was brought before Justice Armit this morning and on pleading guilty to the charge of assault and battery, he was sentenced to serve ninety days in the county jail.

Charles Haikola was arraigned before Justice Jackola Saturday evening on the charge of defrauding his boarding house keeper. On being found guilty, he was placed under suspended sentence, promising to secure work and square his account by Wednesday.

John Sullivan pleaded guilty to the drunk and disorderly charge when arraigned before Justice Jackola today and paid a fine of \$2 and costs.

#### REV. ANDERSON COMING.

Rev. J. A. Anderson of Marinette, district superintendent of the Swedish M. E. churches in this district will arrive in Calumet tomorrow, and will conduct services at the Swedish M. E. church at 7:30 o'clock Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday evenings. He will also remain here until Sunday, conducting the morning and evening services. On Saturday evening, the third quarterly conference will be held.

Lieut. Col. Charles Muir of Chicago has been detailed by the state military board to complete the work of inspecting the militia companies in Michigan, including the Calumet Engineers on the evening of Thursday, May 14. The inspection was started by Capt. R. O. Ragdale who toured about one half of the state up to the time he was detailed to Fort Porter, near Buffalo, about the middle of last week. It is unlikely there will be a change in the inspection dates.

## W. J. GALBRAITH FOR PROSECUTOR

### Calumet Attorney Announces Candidacy on Saturday

Galbraith on Saturday evening announced that he would be a candidate for the Republican nomination for the office of prosecuting attorney of Houghton county at the next primary election. The announcement came somewhat earlier than Mr. Galbraith had intended, he having yielded to the pressure of many friends in entering the race early.
