OLD RATES RESTORED.

The Calumet postoffice has been notified of a change and reduction in the rates for issuing foreign money orders to become effective August 1. The change is ordered so as to equalize the charges on international money orders and practically restore the rates in effect prior to Feb. 1911, when a general increase was ordered. Rates to France, Greece, Norway and Sweden, which were not affected by the 1911 changes will remain the same, but rates to Austria, Great Britain, Germany, Hungary, Italy, Russia, Australia, and South Africa will change. 8,541 BURIALS IN LAKE VIEW

528 Interments During the Past Year, Reports Show

Reports presented at the annual meeting of the Lake View Cemetery association held in Calumet the first of the week, show that during the past year there have been 528 interments in the cemetery, of which 334 were made in the Protestant section of the cemetery, and 194 in the Catholic section. It is almost twenty years since the first burial was made in Lake View cemetery on October, 1894, and since that time there have been 8,541 interments made in the cemetery.
