SPLIT TICKETS NOT ACCEPTED

Voters Must Stick to One Party in the Primary Election

Notwithstanding the many explanations that have been published regarding the revised primary election laws under which the primary election August 25 will be conducted, there still exists considerable confusion among voters as to the exact meaning of the law and some are of the impression that they may vote for candidates on more than one party, in other words "split" their tickets. This impression is absolutely unfounded.

There is no enrollment before the primary election. Any man who is a qualified elector can go to the precinct in which he resides and vote, registering at the same time.

Instead of being handed the ballot of any one party as formerly voters will now be given a ballot with all the parties and their candidates as in a general election. The only difference is, that on election day you can vote for one candidate on one ticket and another candidate on another ticket, but in the primary election you cannot split your vote between several parties. This is not the election of candidates to offices, it is the nomination of candidates that you desire to put on your party ticket to go before the voters on election day.

ENGINEERS ARE READY TO LEAVE FOR STATE CAMP

WILL ENTRAIN AT CALUMET STATION AT 10 O'CLOCK SUNDAY EVENING.

While war and the probability of a great struggle for supremacy between the European powers is so engrossing a topic of conversation in the copper country, the Calumet Engineers are quietly completing preparations for their departure Sunday evening for the state military camp at Grayling to participate in the various maneuvers with the Second Regiment. The company, composed of about seventy-five members, will entrain at the Mineral Run depot tomorrow evening. Two sleeping cars and one baggage car will be provided for the company, and these will be attached to the South Shore train leaving Calumet at 10 o'clock.

The members are especially enthusiastic over the camp this year because of the mobilization of state troops in the copper country for strike duty last summer, prevented the usual camp. Among the faces which will be missed this year are those of Cook Ed. Cummings and Lieut. J. J. Wilmer, both of whom are detained from going to camp because of the pressure of business, and Lieut. Ira Penberthy, who resigned his commission early this year.
