The New York Central's line of packet boats are running on schedule this year, a thing which has not happened before in the history.

RESERVE READY FOR LAKE TOUR

Hancock Middies Sail on Yantic Tomorrow Evening

Officers and members of the Hancock division, Michigan Naval Brigade, are ready for the annual cruise of the great lakes, which will begin tomorrow evening, and will continue until August 24.

The training ship, Yantic, has been secured and scrubbed and the brass fixtures have been shined until they sparkle.

At last night's drill the men were given final instructions in regard to the cruise and many of the little intricate bits of ship life which they have not formerly understood were explained to them.

Every officer and seaman will go aboard tomorrow evening before 7:30 and the veteran ship of the Spanish war will head for Marquette at about 8 o'clock, when the Marquette division will come aboard.


William S. Matheson of Oconto is visiting his daughter, Mrs. George S. Sheard.
