

HIBERNIANS TO ARRIVE MONDAY

Splendid Program for Bi-ennial State Convention Here

Calumet will be invaded next week by an army composed of 300 Michigan Hibernians, members of the Ladies Auxiliary and their friends. The bi-ennial state convention of the order will open here Tuesday morning and continue until Friday, the gathering being the biggest of the many local district and state reunions held this summer. Delegates will leave the lower part of the state this afternoon and evening, via one of the boats of the Detroit and Cleveland Transportation company and will arrive at St. Ignace Monday morning, making the remainder of the trip by rail. They will be joined en route by upper peninsula delegates as well as delegates from towns in the northern tier of lower peninsula counties. Delegates will arrive here Monday evening. LOCAL FIREMEN AWARDED PRIZE

Take First Place in Special Competition at Tourney

The Red Jacket fire department arrived home last evening from the upper peninsula tournament at Ishpeming. Every member of the department is delighted with the splendid treatment received in the Hematite City, and without exception they state the tournament was the most successful held in recent years. They feel especially grateful for the splendid accommodations engaged for them in the New Urban hotel by Clarence Riley, a former resident of Calumet, through whom negotiations were conducted. Ishpeming people proved truly hospitable, the firemen assert, and without exception citizens in all walks of life, as well as the firemen, made special efforts to provide for the comfort and welfare of their guests. Chief Trudell was especially impressed with the splendor of the children's parade, one of the big features. The Red Jacket firemen proved their efficiency yesterday by winning a special race which they entered without previous preparation. The race was not of the order of races held in previous tournaments, though perhaps more practical. A combination auto ladder and hose truck was provided for the contestants and after making a run of about four blocks from the station, the teams were required to make a hydrant connection, lay 150 feet of hose, erect two ladders and climb them with the hose, being timed from the instant they began to remove the hose from the truck until they had the nozzle on top of the roof. Red Jacket had a margin of six full seconds on Bessemer, its nearest competitor. Red Jacket's time being 36 seconds and Bessemer's 42. The victory brought the local department a \$25 cash prize.
