THE call for the election of school directors published elsewhere should be read and borne in mind by all of the people of Amarillo independent school district. Serving without compensation and subject often to severe criticism, it is hard to get representative men to serve, and it is but seldom that as efficient a board as the present one is secured.

Give your mind to the subject, and if you are called do your part as a citizen. History is being made in Amarillo, and in nothing is good management more vitally necessary than in the schools. It is as little as you can do to take part in these matters and see that proper men are selected to the place.

THE most refreshing announcement of recent days is that of Judge Alton B. Parker that he is out of politics for good. The frankness of the statement makes up for its utter lack of necessity. The Judge was retired the dark Tuesday on last November, and the truth of the matter is that he really never was in politics.

THE farmers' congress, to be held in Amarillo in August, will be

an event of much importance to the short grass country, and will have attendants from a territory vast in extent and incomparable in possibilities. It will be the first of its kind ever held, and the interchange of knowledge will be of value beyond estimate.

THE proposition for a central energy telephone system made by the company should be carefully considered by the city council. An improvement of that sort is worth a lot of money to the town, so much that it can hardly be measured in money. The council may be depended upon to settle the matter right, and to protect us from the probability even of two telephone systems, an intolerable nuisance that makes a heavy load for any

town, and seldom results in as good service as where one company is given the proper encouragement. Of course, if the city can get a royalty, or something like that, well and good, but the point should not be carried so far as to miss the projected improvement or subject the people to an unwelcome load.

THE third annual meeting of the Texas association of the Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks convened at Ft. Worth last Monday, and quite naturally the town turned itself inside out in honor of the visitors. Any town would be glad to do that for a body like the Texas Elks. San Antonio was chosen as the next place of meeting, and the following officers were elected: President, Congressman S. B. Cooper, of Beaumont; Vice-President, A. M. McElwee, of Ft. Worth; Treasurer, W. W. Sealy, (re-elected), of Waco.

ADDED interest is given the General Assembly of the Cumberland Presbyterian church, now in session at Fresno, Cal., and which is being attended by M. W. Cunningham, of this city, by the fact that this will probably be the last great gathering of this church.
