## ROUSING MEETING

Important Railroad Matters Discussed—Meeting Friday Night Well Attended.

A big attendance resulted in the call for a general mass meeting held at the court house last Friday evening, when railroad matters of vital importance to Amarillo were discussed.

The meeting was presided over by Dr. David R. Fly, who stated that it was called for the purpose of considering the question of securing a direct cut-off of the Santa Fe into Amarillo, in accordance with contemplated plans in its transcontinental line to the coast.

Avery Turner, vice president and general manager of the Pecos Valley lines was present at the meeting, and in a short talk stated that the prospects for Amarillo securing many new and additional improvements in the present railroad facilities of the Santa Fe were very flattering, and that if the people would properly encourage the matter, Amarillo would receive many permanent improvements in this line. He spoke of the importance of the transcontinental cut-off through this point, and the advantages the enormous amount of traffic would bring to the town and immediate country.

Following Mr. Turner, a number of talks were made, notably those of Gov. Browning, W. H. Fuqua, Will A. Miller, Jr. John J. Burns and Thos. F. Turner. All of these gentlemen spoke of the vital importance of improvements such as were mentioned by Mr.

Turner, and urged immediate action on the part of the people in their co-operation with the railroad in securing what was necessary in having the Santa Fe consider the matter of permanent improvements favorably to Amarillo.

After much discussion and many motions, the entire matter was finally referred to a committee with instructions that this committee act upon it and report with recommendations at an early meeting.
