Pampa, the Coming Town.

Having recently had occasion to visit portions of Western Oklahoma where crops look well and the farmers, each on his quarter section, are displaying the signs of prosperity with half the country under cultivation, I was led to many reflections upon the possibilities of the rich plains of the Panhandle of Texas, which is not yet being used to more than one-tenth of their productive capacity. Even one half of the thick mesquite (the blue grass of the plains) is not yet available for grazing on account of the want of water. Yet the best of water in inexhaustible quantity is everywhere beneath the surface.

The heavy fertile soil, the annual average of more than 20 per cent of rainfall, the hard sub-strata that is almost impervious to water, the ease with which the lands can be cultivated and the precipitation at exactly the right time of the year, are some of the advantages that will make these plains one of the great wheat and feed producing sections of the United States.

The town of Pampa is surrounded by a vast stretch of the finest plains land recently put on the market by the White Deer Land Co. under the management of T. D. These are a few of the feathers that show the direction of the wind, and we believe that as the Panhandle receives and locates the tens of thousands of people now pouring over its border, as the great ranches go and the farmers come, Pampa is one of its coming towns. The needs of this, like all new towns, are many, but these needs are being met—the need of education by a splendid and rapidly growing school.

The new bank, with its up-to-date equipment, promises to supply another of its pressing needs. A crop of active merchants are doing their part with energy and credit. The lumber yards and other enterprises are doing a lively business. The shipments of cattle from this point exceed those of any other Panhandle towns east of Amarillo.

We are anxious, not begging for more people, but those who come receive a hearty welcome, and find the citizens contented and congenial.

Any man who thinks of making a home in this western country can well afford to spend some time in seeing this active, beautiful town—the new-born Queen of the Plains.
