## As Others See Us.

A correspondent of the San Antonio Express writes as follows from our town under date of the 10th inst:

Cotton is coming in slowly and is being bought at low prices, much to the disgust of the farmer. I noticed in some fields the work at work, but between New Braunfels and San Antonio they have done but little damage, while in some places between the former place and San Marcos they are whooping things up. Business is slightly improving in New Braunfels owing to the advent of the railroad, but it will not reach that zenith of excitement that is going on at San Marcos, as the place will not likely be the terminus at all.

After an eighteen mile drive over a stony road along the mountain side I reach the beautiful town of

SAN MARCOS,

which is in strange contrast to the sleepy town that I have just left. Here all is bustle and activity and everything seems imbued with life. A few substantial business houses are in course of erection, while the irrepressible shanty is legion. Like all railroad towns everything is overdone, yet all say they are doing a good business, which is refuted by the countless loafers sitting around on store boxes and counters. The town, so the people say, is booming. The business men here are alive to the wants of the country, and are trying to open up new avenues of trade. By private subscription they are building a new wagon road to Blanco City, and the west, and which, if successful, will take away many a dollar from the now unenterprising capital city. The railroad is expected to be here by the 20th inst., but I think, from appearances, that it will not reach here until the 1st of October, as track laying is only going on at the rate of a half mile a day, and it is about six miles from the city now. When completed here an excursion will come from Austin and participate in a grand barbecue to be given by the citizens in honor of that memorable event. It is conjectured that the terminus will remain here until the road is completed to San Antonio, and ballasted and put in good running order, which will be about the first of January, and if such is the case, San Marcos for the next four months. But that is not in consonance with the action of the railroad men, who will sell town lots at their station of Kyle, about ten miles from San Marcos, on the 15th inst., and at which time a grand barbecue will be given to the citizens of Austin and those surrounding Kyle. If they intend to remain at San Marcos for some time, they would not give their own town the go-by, and I think the latter place will be the terminus of the road until it is finished to your city.
