Commissioners' Court Proceedings.

The Honorable Commissioners' Court convened May 10th and proceeded to transact the following business:

The report of J. V. Hutchins, et al., reviewers for a third-class road between the farms of Z. P. Hagg and T. E. Fourqurean et al, unfavorably to such road, was adopted.

The reports of S. C. Rowe, justice of the peace for precinct No. 4, and of Fred Lord and D. C. Gwin, butchers, were examined and approved, as was also the report of W. W. Slack, justice of the peace for precinct No. 3.

On motion the Clerk was ordered to notify F. D. Turner to open change granted him by order on page 78 of the minutes, or the overseer will be ordered to open said road.

Report of H. E. Barber, tax collector, of occupation taxes for quarter ending March 31, 1886, was examined and approved.

J. H. Patterson, county treasurer, presented his report which was examined and approved as follows:

MAY 11. C. J. Sledge, justice of the peace of precinct No. 2, presented his resignation and that report which were received and approved.

On motion it was ordered that Robert Kyle, P. T. Holt, L. Owens, John Miller, and O. D. Owens constitute a jury to lay out a third-class road, beginning at Pitts' pond and running thence to the McKie ranch; to report at the next regular meeting.

Ordered that W. P. Woods, Wm. Lightfoot, et al., appointed as road overseers be continued in such position until the next term of court.

H. E. Barber, tax collector, presented his report for the quarter ending March 31, 1886, which was examined, corrected and approved.

Applications of E. A. Vaughn and G. T. Hargis for the appointment of justice of the peace in precinct No. 2, made vacant by the resignation of C. J. Sledge, were acted up and required to file their bond in the sum of \$1,000; which bond was filed and approved.

Application of J. M. Kilgough to index the records of the surveyor's office for \$50 was accepted and said Kilgough required to make two copies of said records.

Motion for third-class road from the east corner of the B. Hargis tract of land, at the Dupre and Brady creek road, thence with the line of the 640 acre tract of land of T. Goforth and the B. Hargis tract, thence T. Goforth and the B. Hargis tract, thence Wm. Stone, thence on the line between Trimble and one Block and one Grandy, to intersect the Kyle and Willow Springs road, a distance of two miles. It was ordered that D. Herrick, W. D. Trimble, J. T. Goforth, J. M. Frank and Wm. Stone be appointed a jury to lay out said road and report at the next meeting.

Report of C. S. Cook, justice of the peace of precinct No. 1, and R. H. Manlove, special tax collector, also of Coffee and Peavy and Smith, butchers, were presented and approved.

On motion it was ordered that R. H. Manlove be appointed overseer of county convicts, at a salary of \$40.00 per month, and that said Manlove have full and absolute control of the management and working of the prisoners; and that he work said convicts beginning in precinct No. 1, and when the work in that precinct is completed, he shall report to the commissioner of precinct No. 2 for work, and from thence of precinct No. 3 and 4 respectively. And the said Manlove is instructed to work the said convicts for money where possible.

The court examined and approved the lists of claimants as will appear on the deck et, and ordered drafts to be issued, payable out of the respective funds against which such claims are held.

T. J. McCarty, C. L. Lightfoot, Peter Schmitt and County Judge Kome were all present and their attention attracted to this term of court, payable out of the general fund.

Notice to Water Consumers. Your annual contract with this company expires May 1st, and those who do not wish to renew their contract for the year ending May 1st, 1887 will please call or send their written notice to that effect.

We publish with this issue of the FREE PRESS our rules and regulations in full, and all persons continuing the use of the water after May 1st, 1886 are considered annual consumers, and are subject to the rules and regulations of the company.

We wish it expressly understood that we do not supply water for a shorter period of time than one year, but persons who are compelled to change their residence are granted a release if the rules of the company have been fully complied with.

After this date no persons paying less than \$21.00 per annum will be allowed to use water for garden or yard purposes, with or without a hose.

No person shall make or allow any other use of water than that specified in this application.

The use of hose without nozzle is positively prohibited, neither will continuous streams be permitted to flow from the faucets or hydrants, except where meters are used.

During the time of any fire the use of water is prohibited, except for fire protection and domestic purposes, and at the sound of the fire alarm all hydrants must be closed and kept so until fire is extinguished.

No fountain will be permitted to play or run more than six hours per day. Parties using water for street sprinkling, must confine said water to the amount of ground specified in their contract.

In the case of fraudulent representations on the part of applicants, or use of water not embraced in this lease, or the willful or unreasonable waste of water, or the violation of any of the Rules and Regulations, the Company reserves the right to close off the water without notice.
