

THE REISEL TRAGEDY.

Kaufman Dead—Two Negroes Arrested Yesterday Released.

Mr. Jake Weaver came up from Reisel this morning. His version of the Kaufman killing is, that two strange negroes called Mr. Kaufman up about 9 o'clock on the night of the 19th, stating that they wished to get into the store. They wanted something to eat. Mr. Kaufman opened his store and sold them some canned meats. One of the negroes tendered a five dollar bill and Mr. Kaufman turned to his safe and was in the act of taking out his cash box to get the change when one of the negroes, who had quit eating, stepped up within a few feet of the unsuspecting merchant and fired. The ball entered just behind the left arm, taking a course directly toward the backbone piercing the spine. Mr. Seamers heard the shot and ran to the store. He saw one of the negroes rifling the safe and the other standing with smoking pistol over the prostrate body of their victim. Seamers attempted to get Mr. Kaufman's pistol which was behind the counter but was observed and attacked before he found it. He was forced to retreat and as he ran out of the store three shots were fired at him. The negroes got about \$3 in money out of the safe and escaped to the brush.

Seamers returned with other parties and found Kaufman lying in front of his safe. His body from the middle of his back down was paralyzed, but he was perfectly rational up to 3 p. m. yesterday when he died. He made his will, read it after it had been written yesterday morning, pronounced it all right and affixed his signature. He also signed other papers concerning business matters.

The report that one of the negroes had been caught and hanged, Mr. Weaver said was untrue. The guilty parties have not been caught and

when they are their uncertain identity will, doubtless, prevent summary treatment. The people around Reisel are justly indignant and will scour the country for the murderous wretches until they are found if that is possible.

The two negroes, Leo McGowan and Alber Jones, who were arrested and jailed yesterday on suspicion of being the murderers of Eugene Kaufmann, of Reisel, proved not to be the perpetrators of the deed and were released last night. Mr. Seamers, the party who witnessed the terrible crime and who was shot at several times by the black fiends came to town yesterday evening for the purpose of identifying them and stated that they were not the men wanted.
