Delaware Legislature Imposes Heavy License for Cigarette Dealers—A Protest Against the Tradition Treaty—King Humbert's Silver Wedding—The New Yarker. Campania—Naval Festivities Drawing to an end—Other News.

Humbert's Silver Wedding.

NEW YORK, April 22.—A Rome telegraph says: After a week of preliminary festivity the people of Rome are celebrating to-day the silver wedding of King Humbert I, Queen Margheretta. When, two months ago, the King was crowned, committees were raised in every town with which to properly celebrate the event he notified the pope that the project was not to his liking, and requested that the money collected be devoted to charitable purposes. The committee, however, did not see the matter in the same light as the King is popular, and accordingly it secured permission to go ahead with plans. The day is being celebrated as a general holiday throughout the country. Numerous telegrams were received by the royal couple from the other sovereigns of Europe wishing them long life and happiness, and on the heels of these came a number of delegations bearing gifts and addresses of congratulation. The German Emperor and Empress arrived this afternoon, and were cordially welcomed to the palace. This afternoon there was a grand picnic on the Tiber, and in the evening the Emperor and Empress gave a gala dinner. To-night there will be a gala performance of Verdi's last opera, Falstaff, the orchestra being led by the brilliant old composer in person. At the dinner the evening's representative of every house in Europe was present.

Against the Extradition Treaty.

CHICAGO, April 22.—Tens of thousands of handbills are being distributed today inviting the lovers of liberty to turn out en masse at Central Music Hall tomorrow afternoon for the purpose of recording a vigorous protest of the World's Fair city against the Russian extradition treaty, and of demanding recall by President Cleveland. Chancellor Tuley, the oldest judge on the bench in this city, will preside, and the speakers will include David Swing, Rev. O. P. Lord, Miss Florence Kelly, and the exiled Russians.

Decendant of Columbus.

NEW YORK, April 22.—The Duke of Veragua and party, escorted by Commander Dickens of the United States Navy, left for Washington this afternoon. The distinguished descendant of Columbus is enthusiastic over the hospitalities that have been extended to him in this city, but equally gratified that tomorrow is Sunday, and that it will afford him a day of rest. During the week he has been the guest of honor at no less than thirteen breakfasts, dinners and banquets.

Heavy License for Cigarette Dealers.

DOVER, Del., April 22.—The Delaware legislature adjourned sine die today. One of the most interesting laws which it enacted compels tradesmen selling cigarettes to pay a license fee of one hundred dollars yearly, and forbids the sale of cigarettes to boys under the age of 17. For violation of this law a fine of fifty dollars and imprisonment for any period not exceeding one year is provided for the dealer who sells, as well as for the person who produces the cigarettes.

The Theosophical Society.

NEW YORK, April 22.—Theosophists in large numbers have been arriving in the city during the past twenty-four hours preliminary to the opening of the national convention of the Theosophical Society, which commences tomorrow at the British Rite hall. For the purpose of giving inspiration to the

participants an urn containing a portion of the ashes of Mme. Blavatsky, the former high priestess of the theosophical movement, will rest upon a table immediately to the right of the presiding officer's seat. The convention will be in session for several days, and will consider various suggestions looking to an active propaganda in this country for the strengthening of the faith.

Tiffany-Havemeyer.

NEW YORK, April 22.—His Grace Archbishop Corrigan, assisted by Rev. Richard Bernman, and several other ecclesiastics, officiated today at the marriage of Mr. Perrin Tiffany, son of Mr. and Mrs. George Tiffany, and who is closely related to the August Belmont family, to Miss Marie Havemeyer, daughter of Theodore A. Havemeyer, the multi-millionaire, and Austrian consul in this city. The bride who is an heiress in her own right, was reported some time ago as engaged to the Prince Von Isenberg, and the announcement of her intended marriage to Mr. Tiffany occasioned some surprise at the time. By special consent of Archbishop Corrigan the wedding, instead of being a Cathedral event, was celebrated in the spacious ball room of the Havemeyer mansion at Madison Avenue and 28th street. It was decorated with over a ton of white flowers, roses, lilies and hyacinths, while a large orchestra was hidden behind a mound of lilies of the valley with tall brilliant exotics springing from the center. The invited guests were all members of the four hundred. Miss Dora Havemeyer, a sister of the bride, was maid of honor; William Tiffany was best man, and Perry Belmont and William Tiffany were among the ushers. The wedding was one of the most brilliant of the season.

The Campania.

LONDON, April 22.—The big new Cunarder, the Campania, and which is expected to be a record breaker, left Liverpool for New York today. Ex-Minister Robert T. Lincoln also sailed today for New York, whither his wife and daughter preceded him two weeks ago.

The Chinamen's Case.

KALAMAZOO, Mich., April 22.—The case of the four Chinamen, Lee Yon, Cingit Yon, Lee San and Lee Ok, who were recently arrested by United States deputy marshals, under warrants sworn out under the exclusion act, charging them with unlawfully remaining in this country, is again before United States Commissioner C. H. McGarrin today. The unfortunate Mongolians insist that they have lived in this country from thirteen to fifteen years, and have a host of witnesses on hand to substantiate the statement.

Naval Festivities Drawing to an End.

NORFOLK, Va., April 22.—The festivities preliminary to the great naval review will come to an end this evening, and tomorrow the crews of the various vessels will be working hard to get into trim for departure. There was a yacht race in the harbor this morning, and this afternoon a sham battle between the foreign and American ships is in progress.
