Declarations Upon Which Their Candidates Run.

Whole Field of Politics, National and State Fully Covered.

We hereby endorse the principles enunciated in the People's platform adopted at Omaha, Mo., April 4, 1892.

We declare the People's party to be an anti-monopoly party, and reiterate our opposition to the monopolization of natural resources and public utility by individuals or corporations for speculative purposes.

We declare the monopolies of land, money and transportation to be the fruitful sources of civil and industrial inequality and wrong, the parent monopolies from which all lesser monopolies spring, and to the end that these monopolies and their baneful consequences may be removed we advocate as appropriate measures of relief the abolition of all private banks of issue of every character, whether state or national; the construction, ownership and operation of railroads by the government to the extent necessary to control and regulate rates, and governmental ownership and operation of telephone and telegraph lines; the free and unlimited coinage of gold and silver upon the ratio of 16 to 1; the issuance by the government of legal tender paper money upon some system or plan which, while securing all flexibility, shall regulate the volume of currency to limit it to the actual needs of business.

We condemn emphatically the issue of gold bonds in times of peace to meet current expenses of the government. We favor the building of the Nicaragua canal under proper treaty, provided it is built and operated by our government in proper cooperation with Nicaragua and Costa Rica. We declare that the doctrine of a tariff for revenue is wrong in principle, and we especially condemn the policy of free raw material while manufactured goods are protected.

All lands heretofore granted to individuals or corporations in which the grantees have not complied with the conditions of the grant, should be forfeited to the state for homestead purposes. No alien ownership of land should be allowed in Texas. Corporations shall not be allowed to own more land than they actually use in the prosecution of their business.

We favor an effective system of public schools for six months in the year for all children between the ages of 6 and 18 years, and that each race shall have its own trustees and control its own schools. We demand the uniform adoption of a series of text books for the public schools to be furnished by the state at cost.

We demand an amendment to our state constitution authorizing the loan of our public school funds not otherwise invested upon lands of the people of this state with proper limitations upon the quantity of land and the amount of money.

We demand reformation in the punishment of convicts; that convict labor be taken out of competition with citizens' labor; that convicts be given intellectual and moral instructions, and that the earnings of the convict above the expenses of keeping him, should go to his family.

We demand fair elections and an honest count.

We demand an efficient law that will protect the artisan, mechanic and labor and material men.

We demand a law be passed declaring eight hours to be a legal day's work, except in domestic and agricultural affairs.

We demand that all county officers shall receive for their salaries not to exceed \$2000 per annum net, and that all fees shall be turned in to the general fund.

We demand the establishment of a state bureau of labor.

We favor the creation of a state bureau of arbitration to adjust all

differences between corporations and employes.

We demand that the commissioners' court shall not be allowed to contract a debt against a county for more than \$5000 unless the same be ordered by a majority vote of the county.

We demand the free and unlimited coinage of gold and silver at a ratio of 16 to 1, and that they be made legal tender for all debts.

We demand a sufficiency of good money to supply the wants of trade, and believe that \$50 per capita is required.

We favor such amendment of the vagrant laws as will prevent the prosecution as criminals of industrious laboring men while in a condition of enforced idleness.

While believing government ownership offers the only complete and satisfactory solution of the railroad question, we nevertheless favor the continuance of the commission, but demand that the commissioners shall be elected by the people and that the law shall be administered in the spirit of fairness to all parties.

We demand that the state provide sufficient accommodation for all its insane, without discrimination in color.

We favor proportional representation.

We declare the People's party to be in favor of local self government and the enjoyment by the individual of his natural rights to the greatest extent compatible with good society.

We favor such amendments to our constitution and tax laws as will secure the assessment of lands and improvements separately.

We favor a modification of the laws of limitation as to real estate, to the end that titles to lands may be quieted.

An Appeal for Funds.

Philadelphia, June 22.—A final appeal has been issued to 800 representative citizens asking them to contribute the sum of \$5 each to make up the balance of \$3000 necessary to complete the payment for the equestrian statue of Gen. Geo. B. McClellan, and which is now ready to be mounted on its pedestal in the city hall plaza. This city was the birth place of General McClellan, and when the fund is completed the tribute to the soldier, patriot and citizen will be unveiled with imposing ceremonies. A number of subscriptions were received this morning.

Eastern Republicans En Route.

New York, June 22.—Two special trains today carried the Eastern delegates en route to the Republican convention at Denver. The Pennsylvania, Maryland and New Jersey delegates went by way of the Pennsylvania, while those from New York and the New England states took the New York Central. The trains were decorated with banners indicating the mission of the travellers. All the delegations will unite in Chicago, and go thence to Denver in a body.

Army of the Potomac.

Concord, N. H., June 22.—The closing sessions of the 25th annual reunion of the Society of the Army of the Potomac were held today. This morning, after a brief business meeting, the delegates were taken by steamers to Weir, where they inspected the veteran's camp. With the annual banquet this evening the reunion will be at an end and the veterans will again scatter themselves over the country.

National Sangerfest.

New York, June 22.—The German sections of the city are in holiday dress today in honor of the delegates and visitors who are here for the great national Sangerfest which opens tomorrow in Madison Square Garden. The arrivals already number fully one thousand, and today every train from the west is adding its quota. Milwaukee and other points in Wisconsin, Cincinnati, Chicago, Cleveland, Buffalo, Pittsburg, Philadelphia, and, in fact, all of the important cities east of the Mississippi are represented, and the executive committee finds its hands full in welcoming and assigning the strangers to the headquarters reserved for them.

The Sangerfest will be ushered in this evening with a procession in which 20,000 Germans carrying torches will take part. They will march to the sound of vocal music. The veteran General Franz Sigel has been selected as grand marshal. The parades this morning are providing themselves with Alpine hats. Between the Arton and Liederkrantz societies six horses will draw a large float representing the Apotheosis of Music and Song, and which will be illuminated by electricity. The center illustration will be Lohengrin, Apollo, and the Goddess of Liberty, surrounded by heroes and heroines from the great operas and a host of symbolic groups. A rehearsal this morning indicated that it would be the most magnificent float ever seen in this country. Governor Flower, Mayor Gilroy, and numerous representative citizens will review the procession from the balcony of Madison Square Garden.

Important Trade Conference.

Ottawa, Ont., June 22.—One of the most important trade conferences ever held on the North American continent opened here today. It is composed of delegates from the Canadian provinces and the colonies of the British Empire, and its purpose is to discuss inter-imperial trade interests and commercial conditions. The scene of the opening session of the congress was the chamber of the department of trade and commerce in the government building. Mackenzie Rowell, minister of trade and commerce, and George E. Foster, minister of finance, represented the Imperial Canadian Federation, and the other delegates were as follows: New South Wales, W. H. Sattor, vice president executive council; Victoria, Attorney General Sir Henry Wrixon, Simon Fraser and M. Fitzgerald; Queensland, Sir E. Forrest and Minister of Justice A. J. Thymme; South Australia, E. Pulford; New Zealand, Alfred L. Smith; South Africa, Sir J. H. De Villiers, chief justice of Cape Colony, Sir Charles Mills, agent general in London, and J. A. Hofmeyer, Cape Town chamber of commerce; Tasmania, E. N. C. Bradon, agent general in London; the Earl of Jersey, representing the government of Great Britain. According to a statement made in the house of commons a few nights ago Ministers Bowell and Foster have no authority to pledge the government of Great Britain to any of the proposals of the conference. The sessions are being held with closed doors. One and all of the delegates agree that the question of Imperial Federation will not be considered, and that if any attempt is made to bring it up it will be promptly squelched. The subjects scheduled for discussion include the better development of trade between the mother country and the colonies, an imperial customs union for a reciprocity arrangement satisfactory to all concerned, and a British freight and passenger highway around the world.

Reception to Miss Willard.

New York, June 22.—It was nearly midnight when the reception extended to Miss Frances E. Willard by the State Women's Christian Temperance Union in celebration of her return from her long trip abroad came to a close. Dr. McArthur's church, in which it was held, was crowded to suffocation, Catholic, Protestant and undenominational temperance societies, the Salvation Army, societies for the prevention of crime and vice, women suffrage and labor societies being represented. Mrs. Ole Bull came all the way from Boston in order to be present.

Emperor William's Trip

Berlin, June 22.—The Emperor William sailed from Kiel today on board the Imperial Yacht Hohenzollern en route for his visit to England. He was accompanied by Herr Hulzen, manager of the Royal Theatre Wiesbaden, who will be the special guest of the emperor on the trip. The manager is an expert card magician, and the emperor takes considerable pleasure in witnessing the performance of his feats. The yacht will stop at The Hague and the emperor will pay a short visit to the Queen Regent and the queen. Then he will proceed to Cowes, Isle of Wight. His plans contemplate a shooting trip through the highlands of Scotland.
