ANECDOTE OF MACMAHON.

It Shows the Manner in Which He Ruled France.

It is seventeen years since Marshal MacMahon, then president of the Republic, wrote the celebrated letter in which he called on M. Jules Simon to resign the premiership. This was the starting point of that strange and almost humiliating period styled the 16th of May, which lasted six months, at the end of which time the Conservative party, which had been carrying on public affairs, was vanquished by universal suffrage and fell dead, so to speak, on the battlefield. If I now revert to it after seventeen years' silence it is because M. Simon himself, in today's Figaro, has an article of three columns upon the 16th of May. He was its chief and most signal victim, though the entire Monarchist party may also be said to have been victims.

What I am about to say relates to a dinner on May 6, 1877, at which were present among others, M. Henri Germain, chairman of the Credit Lyonnais, and M. Legouve, the academicien. I do not recollect the names of the other guests, 15 or 16 in number, but I mention these two because they are still living and I can invoke their testimony. Here, then, is what passed. A cabinet council at the beginning of May was discussing the line to be taken by the government on an interpellation by M. le Blond. M. Jules Simon and Marshal MacMahon held the same opinion, but the other ministers took a contrary view.

Thereupon M. Simon said: "My dear colleagues, the president of the republic and I are of the same opinion on the attitude which the government should take in regard to M. le Blond's interpellation. I have told you the reason for my opinion, which is also that of the president of the republic. If you agree to follow me we shall have the president of the republic with us, which will materially help us to command a majority in the chamber. If, on the contrary, you persist in your view, do you know what will happen? Marshal MacMahon, convinced that he cannot govern you, will form a resolution which I cannot precisely state beforehand, but its aim and result will be to force us to go out of office, leaving the Marshal, or rather those in whose name he acts, master of the battlefield. The marshal will then send for the Duke de Broglie, will intrust him with the premiership, will attempt to govern with a Broglie cabinet, and, encountering the opposition of the chamber, will obtain from the senate the right of dissolving it. Whereupon he will hold fresh elections, exercising the most violent pressure on the constituencies. This would be a calamity and I beg you to spare our country from it." A long silence ensued. Everybody expected the marshal to protest against what M. Jules Simon had said. He was visibly agitated, but after a few minutes, raising his head and turning to M. Simon, he simply said, "Parfaitement." This caused veritable stupefaction in the cabinet council. Discussion was broken off and the ministers separated. — London Times.
