

THE STATE ELECTION.

BOTH SIDES STILL VIGOROUSLY CLAIMING THE GOVERNORSHIP.

The Hogg People Claim Forty Thousand Majority While Chairman Matlock Says It is Very Close and Hinges on the Third Party Vote.

FORT WORTH, Tex., Nov. 9.—At 11 o'clock last night Chairman Matlock said he thought the vote of the state would go 360,000 or 375,000, and that Clark would get 180,000 or 175,000 of the vote; that he thought the vote was close but that Clark was elected, though this result would be controlled by the way the Third party people stuck to their ticket.

GALVESTON. GALVESTON, Nov. 9.—Returns from this county are yet incomplete, the larger wards of the city not yet having finished their count.

HUBBARD CITY. HUBBARD CITY, Tex., Nov. 9.—Vote all counted. Hogg 29, Clark 185, Nugent 100.

KYLE. KYLE, Nov. 9.—The vote at this place stands: Hogg 250, Clark 215, Nugent 70; for state senator Hutchinson 301, Barnes 106; representative, Martin 104, McGehee 278, Bunton 375, Sam Johnson 102; for county attorney, Crews 294, Springer 214; for sheriff, Jackson 281, Davis 167, Townsend 65; for assessor, Oldham 301, Forbairn 155, Ebeles 65; for collector, H. A. McMeans 409, J. A. Dixon 99; neighbors for judge, Storey for county clerk, Peel for district clerk, McNutt for surveyor and C. M. Wallis for public weigher, had no opposition. Total vote here 556. Best advices give Hogg the county by 65 to 100 majority.

LAMAR. FORT WORTH, Nov. 9.—The city of Paris gives Clark for governor 1192, Hogg 613, outside of the city thirteen precincts give Hogg 1350, Clark 700, Nugent 595; ten precincts yet to come in, four of which are known to be for Clark, balance probably for Hogg. Ballot box was reported stolen at one Clark box. All other Democratic nominees, including Culbertson for congress, got united Hogg and Clark Democratic strength. Hogg polled twenty-five per cent of Republican votes.

MARSHALL. MARSHALL, Nov. 9.—The vote of Hamilton county is: Hogg 4324, Clark 725, Nugent 194. Two precincts not yet heard from. They will not materially alter the result. The Citizens county ticket was elected without opposition.

SULPHUR SPRINGS. SULPHUR SPRINGS, Nov. 9.—Returns received so far indicate a plurality of 100 for Hogg in the county. Nugent second, Clark third.

SMITH COUNTY. TYLER, Nov. 9.—Seventeen precincts outside of Tyler give Hogg 800 plurality. Smith county will give him about 1200 plurality. The city is wild with joy since the telegram from the managing editor of the Globe Democrat conceding Cleveland's election arrived. The entire county Democratic ticket is elected by a large majority.

MERIDIAN. MERIDIAN, Nov. 9.—All but four small boxes have been heard from. The gubernatorial vote stands Hogg 1216, Nugent 766, Clark 450. The other boxes will not change the result materially from the foregoing.

FREDERICKSBURG. FREDERICKSBURG, Nov. 9.—Returns are coming in slowly. Nine boxes give for governor, Hogg 58, Clark 622, Houston 1, Nugent 232; for lieutenant governor, Crane 12, Rogers 563, Martin 166; for comptroller, McCall 90, Allen 610, Mosley 229; for treasurer, Wortham 64, Goree 608, Durham 152; for land commissioner, McGaughey 45, Walsh 560, McCulloch 200; state superintendent, Carl-

le 43, Bickler 687, Chambe's 208; for congress, Paschal 216, Terrell 374, McMinn 214; for state senate, Lewis 519, Robinson 44, McRea 231.

Highsmith, county judge; E. L. Steudevat, county clerk; R. M. Warden, sheriff and collector; Roll Ware treasurer; Lon D. Morris, county attorney; A. R. Wallace, assessor; W. D. Twelchett, county surveyor; Sam F. Drury, animal inspector.

MITCHELL COUNTY. COLORADO, Nov. 9.—Mitchell county complete gives Hogg 275, Clark 265, Nugent 62. Vote for county officers remarkably close. J. D. Murray elected sheriff by 1 majority, Xavier Ryan judge by 5, J. W. Smith inspector by 5.

MARION COUNTY. JEFFERSON, Nov. 9.—Returns so far, with five small boxes to hear from, give Hogg 800, Clark 517, Nugent 130, D. B. Culbertson 1300, Hinley 600, Pat Clark 250.

Sherman—Three wards in this city give Hogg 575, Clark 636, Nugent 56, Houston 15; fifteen boxes in the country give Hogg 2282, Clark 2291, Nugent 811. The Hogg strongholds are yet to hear from.

UVALDE. UVALDE, Nov. 9.—Hogg's majority estimated at 160 over Clark, 300 over Nugent. Crain for congress, majority 400.

LAREDO. LAREDO, Nov. 9.—Clark's majority in the city of 1100 will be increased in the county to 1500. Crain's majority about 300.

ABILENE. ABILENE, Nov. 9.—Abilene precinct as completed gives a total vote of 954 and gives Clark 395, Hogg 310, Nugent 226; Cockrell for congress 476, Matthey, Peoples party 6; Daily, Republican, 189. For state senate Baird, Peoples party, 837, Baldwin, Democrat, 574; representative Finnan, Peoples party, 395, Cunningham, Democrat, 507. Hogg will possibly carry the county by a plurality of 125, Clark second. DANGERFIELD. DANGERFIELD, Nov. 9.—Hogg carried the county over Nugent about 100, over Clark about 400.

COMANCHE. COMANCHE, Nov. 9.—Hogg 1300, Nugent 1800, Clark 150, Prohibition 25. As far as heard from the Third party ticket is elected in this county except county attorney and possibly the sheriff.

ALPINE. ALPINE, Nov. 9.—For governor, Hogg 73, Clark 87; for congress Twelfth district, Paschal 138, Terrell 18.

LIBERTY HILL. LIBERTY HILL, Nov. 9.—Total number of votes cast 220 and according to the best figures it will be near the following: Hogg 110, Clark 60, Nugent 50. Full and complete vote will be furnished tomorrow. Everything quiet and fearfully muddy.

BROWNSVILLE. BROWNSVILLE, Nov. 9.—The four city wards and six county precincts give for governor, Hogg 1068, Clark 804; for congress, Corean (Democrat) 1069, Brewster (Republican) 680, Terrell (Populist) 10.

MT. VERNON. MT. VERNON, Nov. 9.—Following is the vote of this county for president: Cleveland 786, Harrison 4, Weaver 2505. For governor, Hogg 729, Nugent 325, Clark 43; for congress, Culbertson 478, Clark 298; for state senator, Cranford 764, E. Farmer 311; for representative, Templeton 757, Edwards 839; for district judge, Shepard 784,

James Culbertson 890; for district attorney, Miram Glass 790, Brooks 820; for attorney general, Culbertson 729, Daves 829.

TARRANT COUNTY. FORT WORTH, Nov. 9.—Hogg carries Tarrant county by about 250 plurality with five county precincts to hear from. The vote is: Hogg 2993, Clark 2774, Nugent about 1740. The boxes to report will increase Hogg's and Nugent's vote, but will not aid much to Clark's. The whole county Democratic ticket is elected. Swayne will have a majority in the county over Beck with for senator of about 400, and in the district will beat him 2500.

CEDAR PARK. CEDAR PARK, Nov. 9.—The official count here shows Hogg has received 37 votes, Clark 5, Nugent 10, Culbertson 38, McCall 39, Lips 12, Hatton 18, Cochran 36, Morris 10, Faubion 31 and his opponent Jackson 16, Barleson 40 and Granberry 10. The presidential electors of the Republican and the Peoples party suffered on account of the improper printing of the tickets.

GILMER. GILMER, Nov. 9.—The vote of this county is about 2200. Hogg received 1300, Clark 100, Nugent about 600, with scattering voter for other candidates. Cleveland's vote about the same as Hogg's. All the county Democratic nominees are elected by a large majority. Phillips, for representative, was elected by a handsome majority. Kilgore for congress, beat J. M. Ferders by 600 majority. A light vote was polled.

From Marble Falls. Special to The Statesman. MARBLE FALLS, Tex., Nov. 9.—Among the present improvements going on in Marble Falls may be noted several new buildings, both residence and business, under construction. Work on the flume at the falls preparatory to the electric light and water works plants, and the change of schedule in the Austin and North-western railroad, is very satisfactory. We now have three railroad mails per day. The Marble Falls university has an attendance of about 300. A literary society has been organized by the students. There is no reason why this school should not develop into a first class college. Cotton shipments for this season amount to about 2000 bales. Considerable wool and pecan shipments have also been made.

The managers state that the paper will issue again in a day or two with all claims adjusted. They say unfair advantage was taken of the paper on a legal technicality.

THE LOCAL ELECTION.

Travis Will Give Clark 2000 Plurality. The returns from the election in Austin were exceedingly slow coming in yesterday. The system tried for the first time in this election has been found to be exceedingly cumbersome, making it tedious and trying on the judges to count the complicated ballots and arrive at the results. It was found to suit the voters no better than the judges. Some of the most intelligent men in the city failed to properly prepare their ballots, and as a result they were thrown out. When intelligent men fail to cast their ballots in legal shape, what can be expected from the ignorant classes. In all the wards large numbers of ballots were discovered to have been vitiated by pure carelessness and ignorance, and were consequently thrown out. Judging from the experience of Austin the new system is not a howling success, and many changes may be made in its provisions between now and the next election with good results.

As will be seen by the tabulated statement in another column the vote in Travis county has been lighter than was anticipated. This is attributed to the terrible disagreeable day and also to the fact that such a large number of ballots were found to be illegal and were thrown out. There were enough votes cast, however, to carry grief and dismay to many candidates, to whom THE STATESMAN extends sympathy and wishes for better luck next time.

Of course, being a woman, she can't appear in a bicycle tournament, and play catcher in a royal base ball game or get jolly drunk like the Prince of Wales, but she can buy hair pins made of gold and wear embroidered skirts that would make a pretty factory girl wince with envy. Then she can eat more than we eat at a \$5 boarding house and the soup won't be cold when it is served. But then, I had rather be a porter in a chicle confectionery than to be as stingy as she is.
