Democratic Club. Pursuant to adjournment the San Saba Democratic club met at the court house last Monday night for the purpose of completing permanent organization. The meeting was called to order by temporary chairman Wm. Godfrey. The committee on Constitution and By-laws made their report. The report with some few amendments was adopted. Permanent officers were then elected as follows, Judge Geo. Harris president, Col. J. Hagan secretary and treasury.

Messrs T. Y. Elton, Wm. Godfrey and W. H. Anderson were appointed a standing committee to select speakers for the several meetings of the club.

Messrs T. M. Gray, H. M. Montgomery and G. A. Walters, were appointed a committee to recommend some good democratic newspapers to the members of the club.

Mr. Jno. Seiders was appointed to employ a janitor. Colonel Jones was selected to address the next meeting of the club, which will be held at the court house Monday night Aug. 22. The subject of his address is "The History, Principles and Prospects of the Democratic party." The public is invited to be present.

The Club now has about 85 members.

Judge H. C. Fisher, of San Angelo, Texas, the Democratic nominee for Chief Justice of Supreme Court from the 3rd Supreme Judicial District, is a native of Miss., and son of S E Fisher of the supreme bench of Miss.

He came to Texas in his early manhood and studied law with his brother, the well known Armstead Fisher, of Georgetown, Texas. Was admitted to the Bar in Travis county in June 1873. Soon after which he came to San Saba, where he did his first law practice.

He married Miss Poole, sister to our well known John Poole of San Saba.

Judge Fisher was elected County Judge of San Saba county, the only office which he ever sought or held until he was appointed by the Governor in May, 1891, to fill the position of Commissioner Section B. Supreme Court. Which position he now holds.

The convention which nominated Judge Fisher was composed principally of lawyers and comprised the best legal talent in the district.

Judge Fisher was nominated on the 1st ballot for the highest position; Chief Justice. It is said to his honor that he refrained strictly from taking any part in the contest.

THE CONVENTION. Mr. J. L. Lewis, Chairman of the 9th Representative district, called the convention to order at the Court House on Friday, Aug. 5th, at 10 o'clock a. m., but owing to the absence of the McCulloch County delegation, the opening hour was set for 1:30 p. m. At that hour Mr. Lewis called the convention to order and made a few remarks, followed by Col. G. S. Jones in an address of welcome on behalf of the Democracy of San Saba. D. H. Triplett, of Mills county, replied for the delegates.

J. L. Lewis was selected as temporary chairman, John Seiders Secretary, and on motion the following committees were appointed: Resolutions.—W T Melton, J J Cox, J T White.

Credentials, permanent organization and basis of representation.—J B Murray, W J Wilson, W T Melton.

The committee on resolutions reported recommending that all delegates present pledge themselves to support all Democratic nominees National, State and District, and endorsed Hon. R. Q. Mills for the U. S. Senate.

Committee on credentials, etc. reported that San Saba county was entitled to 3 votes, Mills 3, McCulloch 2, Concho 1, total 6.

Delegates: San Saba County: W J Wilson, J T White and N C Brown. Mills County: J L Lewis, J B Murray, J J Cox, J B Baker, D S Kelly, and R P Goubaour.

Concho: W T Melton, J W Batchford and J E Howze. McCulloch: Not represented.

They recommended that the two thirds rule be adopted and that the temporary organization be made permanent, all of which was adopted.

Nominations were declared in order, and Joe Frazier Brown, of San Saba, J L Spencer, of Mills, and D E Sims, of Concho, were placed in nomination. The vote stood 3 for Brown, 3 for Spencer and 1 for Sims, and on the 25th ballot Joe Frazier Brown was nominated. Mr. Brown was brought in and delivered a short address, accepting the nomination.

On motion D E Sims, of Concho county was elected chairman of this district for the next two years. A vote of thanks was extended to the Democracy of San Saba for courtesies extended, for the music rendered by the Band, &c.

On motion the Sec'y was requested to report the proceedings to papers of the district; and the convention adjourned.
