Ed. News.—In Aug. 1861 an election for county officers was held. James Kelley was elected sheriff, John W. Baker district clerk and assessor, Wiley Murray treasurer, Barlow Trowbridge surveyor, John P. Warren county clerk.  
W. H. Harrell was the only notary public in San Saba county at that time.  
On Oct. 7th the Indians killed Chainey Couch, (known in Texas history as Chaney Couch) on Deer Creek.  
It appears that Mr. Couch had cut some board timber one evening, intending to fetch his team the next day, split the timber into boards and to haul them home.  
The next day Mr. Couch put his oxen to the fore wheels of his wagon and started for his board timber; his son-in-law, W. L. Hayes, going on foot and taking a nearer route. The latter took his gun with him, thinking that he might get a shot at some deer which he knew to be near. Mr. Hayes went on but found no deer. He at last came to the board-cuts and began taking the bark off, preparatory to making boards.  
After stripping the bark off, Hayes waited sometime for his father to come up as the tools were in the cart. At last becoming impatient at Couch's delay, Hayes began to hallow loudly, but could get no response. He then shouldered his rifle and started for the other board-cut, a distance of a few hundred yards below the first. Still Couch had not come. The cart's tires being loose, Hayes thought that the cart had certainly broken down, and so went on in the direction which it would come, for some distance, when he saw hundreds of buzzards collecting a short distance from the road. Couch had shot a deer the day before near this place, but failed to secure it. After searching for the carcass for some time and failing to find it, Hayes returned to the road, and proceeded on in the direction which he was going before turning off.  
In crossing a shallow ravine Hayes found the body of Chainey Couch lying three hundred yards east of his cart. The body was scalped and stripped of all clothing, excepting one shoe. The other, however, lay on the ground a short distance away. The body had a lance wound through the left breast and two arrow wounds. Hayes thinks that the Indians lassoed Couch and dragged him where he was found. A piece of scantling (a part of the cart frame) was found a short distance from the cart. Hayes thinks it very probable that the dead man used this as a weapon of defense against the redskins.  
Judging from the number of horse tracks around the scene of murder, there were eleven Indians. They went to Fall Creek where they lost Couch's pocket knife, and stole a number of horses. Two days later those Indians came back the same way that they had gone out. Nearly thirty men from Cherokee Creek started in pursuit but lost them near Spice Locks, Mason County.  
This ended the bloody work of the savages in San Saba for 1865.

Encampments are usually enjoyed more than any other kind of recreation, and to this all will agree who visited Sulphur Springs. A jolly crowd of about eighteen with the chaperons, started from San Saba, Tuesday Aug. 9th, and arrived at the appointed place, twenty-five miles distant, the same evening before dusk, although our expectations and curiosity were very great, they were satisfied to the utmost extent. The roads were muddy and sloughs continually falling, yet the trip was quite enjoyable. A high grassy spot near the bank of the river was selected for the location. Our rude tables of plank stationed on posts driven into the ground, blended perfectly with the rest of the scenery. Our seats were rustic indeed, being chiefly boxes, wagon seats, and long loops of grape vine. With the exception of our two tents the canopy of the oak and elm. Resorts were plentiful. About two hundred yards down the river, bubbles up a beautiful flowing spring, and by the breezes that came from that direction, the presence of sulphur is easily detected. One side of the spring is formed by a cliff about twenty feet high; the names and dates on which, show it to be a resort of no recent discovery. Dates are there as far back as 1852 and on up to the present year. Near the spring is situated the bath house, which is equally enjoyed by all the visitors. Amusements of all kinds were afforded. Bouts, horse back, riding, croquet, cards and numerous other enjoyments. Also Cornet, guitar, and other musical instruments, making camp life very enjoyable. The scenery is beautiful, being odd and curious. The high rugged bluffs on one side of the river is covered with usual mountain decorations, cedar predominating on the opposite side, again the high bluff appears, though not forming the bank of the river, there being some space left sufficient for camping, through the two bluffs flows the rivers bending and foaming, rushes over rocks and cliffs making "a music sweet to hear."  
After making a visit of about a week the party returned, all agreeing to have never spent a more enjoyable week. VISITOR.
