San Saba County Teachers Association.

The Association met Nov. 26, 1892, and the house was called to order by G. H. Hagan tempore chairman.

Committee on constitution called for and Messrs Reagan and Alexander each read a report.

Constitution offered by Mr. Reagan adopted after being amended.

Then the following permanent officers were elected: G. H. Hagan, president; Mrs. Bama Harris, 1st vice president; W. W. Higgins 2nd vice president; Miss Annie Reagan recording secretary; Mr. Alexander corresponding secretary.

Motion carried to appoint a committee of three to draw up resolutions favoring the election of a County Superintendent for this county, to be offered at next regular meeting, and Messrs Reagan, Graham and Higgins were appointed.

By motion the corresponding secretary was instructed to write to all the teachers of Mills and Llano counties to see whether or not there could be an interest worked up in a Summer Normal in San Saba next summer.

Moved and carried that the Association meet at Richland Springs the last Saturday in January.

Before digging the sweet potatoes go into the patch and take a sample tuber from two, three, or several parts of the patch, break or cut them and lay the pieces away for two or three days. If the freshly broken or cut surfaces turn black or brown, or show a coating of rotten structure, don't dig the crop; wait awhile and repeat the test. When the samples are dug with comparative safety, for, if put up so as to be protected from frost and rain, they will probably keep sound until spring. When the potato is not in proper condition, no manner of storing, so far as is yet known, will prevent rotting.—Texas Farm and Ranch.

Election Ordered

Whereas a petition has been presented to me signed by Geo. Harris and twenty-four other citizens of the town of San Saba, asking that an election be ordered to determine whether or not the town of San Saba and the territory adjacent included in the red notes given below shall incorporate for school purposes with boundaries as follows, to-wit:

Beginning at the upper end of the L. B. Harris survey No. 13, east corner, being on the North bank of the San Saba river about 2000 yards North 70° E. from San Saba town; Thence North 40° W. with the E. corner of said survey 1455 yards to the E. corner of a tract of 200 acres of land sold by L. B. Harris to Samuel Lynn; Thence N. 15° E. with the N. W. boundary line of said E. Harris survey No. 13, north corner, at 1244 the South corner of 100 acres tract of land owned by C. G. Moore; Thence N. 45° W. with the N. E. corner of said survey No. 13, to the E. corner of the Morgan tract No. 19; Thence S. with said line 1000 to a stake; Thence S. with the S. boundary line of said E. Harris survey No. 13, to the E. corner of the John Noll survey No. 17; Thence N. 15° E. with the S. boundary line of 1000 yards to the S. W. corner of said survey; Thence E. with its S. boundary line 1000 yards to the W. corner of the S. P. Weber survey No. 129; Thence S. E. with its S. W. boundary line 250 yards; Thence E. to the S. E. boundary line of said Weber survey; Thence N. 45° E. with said line 250 to the S. corner of 111 acres tract located by H. W. James Entwistle to Joe Kelley; Thence E. 1400 yards to the E. corner of S. P. Weber survey No. 129; Thence N. 15° E. with the S. E. corner of said survey; Thence N. 45° E. with its S. boundary line 1000 yards to the W. corner of the S. P. Weber survey; Thence S. E. with its S. W. boundary line 250 yards to the S. corner of the 100 acre tract east of the north end of the E. Gilliam survey No. 12; Thence to the N. W. corner of the S. P. Weber survey; Thence N. 45° E. with said line to the S. S. corner of the S. P. Weber survey with all its lands extending to the place of beginning.

San Francisco 4 July. J. M. Carter, Judge of San Saba county, by virtue of the authority vested in me by law and by virtue of the statute in such cases made and provided, do hereby give notice that an election shall be held at the Court House, in said county of San Saba, on Thursday the 15th day of December, 1892, to determine by the vote of the duly qualified voters living within the limits of the above described territory, whether or not said territory shall incorporate for school purposes under the name of the San Saba Public Free School, and there by appoint J. The suit of Cunningham et al vs San Saba County has been reversed and remanded by the Civil Supreme court of Tex. As will be remembered this suit involved a question as to whether a county that has been using a road on open lands can claim the same when the owner of the lands wishes to fence the land, without allowing the owner the usual damages. From the opinion rendered on reversing the case it would seem that the county can claim the road but must pay the owner the usual damages.
