

WASHINGTON, Sept. 5.—The Senate today substituted a bill for the Darwin measure, which provides for the election of one elective commissioner to the administration of the Darwin Islands.

ENGLAND, FRANCE AND RUSSIA SIGN AGREEMENT NOT TO MAKE PEACE EXCEPT ALL ARE AGREED

Hope That Gathering of Triple Entente Might Yet Cause Turkey to Remain Neutral--Contest In Diplomacy Between London and Berlin With Turkey to Decide The Victor--Russians Defeat Austrians

WASHINGTON, Sept. 5.—Officials and diplomats here believed tonight that the agreement signed today by Great Britain, Russia and France is not to make peace except by mutual agreement means the war will be fought to a decisive end and the conflict prolonged.

On all sides it is believed the Allies intend to prosecute the war in all quarters, irrespective of the outcome in France. From all parts of the globe, England's colonial troops are gathering.

Hope that the gathering of the triple entente might yet cause Turkey to remain neutral was divided among departments. The contest in diplomacy between Berlin and London has been causing considerable worry around the world.

The Allies, it is understood, have expected Turkey to openly align herself with Germany and Austria, but the delay in the Porte's action, although construed by many as merely a means of completing military preparations, has produced a ray of hope that the war party in Constantinople will not triumph.

The conservative party in Turkey contends that Turkey's finances were so consumed in the last wars that a new conflict would be economically ruinous and her Mediterranean ports would be at the mercy of Anglo-French fleets, while the Balkan states waged a separate war on land.

All these considerations have been placed before the Porte by diplomats representing the Allies. Last night, however, show wavering with the military arm of the Ottoman Empire preparing for all eventualities.

Reports that Greece announced she would remain neutral were expected to have an encouraging effect at Constantinople. The decision of the Porte on war and peace depends almost entirely on what alignment will be in the Balkans. Turkey is not so sure of Roumanian support as previously.

Roumania, it is said, has had a secret alliance with Austria for some time and always has harbored a grudge against Russia. Roumanians, however, are racially slavish and latest intimations are that they plan to offset any help Bulgaria might give Turkey.

Circumstances are believed to have arose to have the Porte delay action until he can learn better the intentions of northern neighbors.

DUTCH ARMY PROVIDED WITH PLENTY TO SMOKE

POPULAR CONTRIBUTIONS IN HOLLAND MAKE ARMY ONE OF BEST EQUIPPED.

THE ASSOCIATED PRESS. AMSTERDAM, Sept. 5.—The Dutch army believes it has the best equipped army in Europe so far as smoking comforts go. The day's smoking during the first days of mobilization, went all over the city of Amsterdam with barrels of smoking cigars for the soldiers. The total was too big to count, but within two hours one day more than 20,000 cigars were distributed. Passively emptied their cases, dealers presented full boxes, and non-smokers contributed money for the purchase of cigars. All along the frontier the soldiers were seen comfortably puffing away at their pipes.

BERLIN ANNOUNCES THE CAPTURE OF DENDERMONDE

REPORT FROM BERLIN CLAIMS CAPTURE OF 12,000 SOLDIERS AND ARTILLERY.

ROTTERDAM, Sept. 5.—Berlin officially announces the German today captured Dendermonde, sixteen miles east of Ghent, the Belgians are retreating toward Antwerp.

ALLIES MAKING VIGOROUS DEFENSE OF MAUBEUGE

PORTION OF ENGLISH EXPEDITIONARY FORCE IS AIDING THE FRENCH.

(By Associated Press.) LONDON, Sept. 5.—A portion of the British expeditionary force is aiding the French in stoutly defending Maubeuge, a French fortified town in the department of Concord, from the Germans.

This is a report current in military circles here. A German official statement admits the French still hold Maubeuge.

A dispatch from Antwerp says the British evacuated their fortified town of Tournai (Dendermonde), which the Germans were bombarding. The British engineers, the dispatch adds, have bombed several districts including Malines.

Great advisers say a German aeroplane this morning dropped two bombs in Ghent, but killed no persons.

AUSTRIAN RETREAT BECOMES A ROUT CLAIMS RUSSIANS

AUSTRIAN ARMY HAS BEEN FLUNG BACK WITH COSACKS PURSUING.

(By Associated Press.) GENEVA, Sept. 5.—Reports here say the Austrian army has been flung back upon the Carpathians, their retreat becoming a rout with the Cosacks pursuing them.

According to Berlin reports, great numbers of Germans are being withdrawn from the French and German frontiers to fight the advancing Russians from the east.

OLEOMARGARINE FRAUD CHARGED

COLUMBUS, Sept. 5.—Grand jury indictments were returned here today against six officials and employees of the Capital City Dairy company of Columbus and the company as a corporation. It is alleged the company made and sold artificially colored oleomargarine, reporting it to revenue collectors as unadorned and paying only a tax of 1-4 cent a pound instead of 10 cents a pound imposed on colored product.

LATE TELEGRAPHIC NEWS

(By Associated Press.) NEW YORK, Sept. 5.—Benjamin A. Hollis, accidentally discharged a thirty caliber rifle yesterday while hunting near San Domingo ranch, completely shattering his right foot, its amputation may follow.

DETROIT, Sept. 5.—Two masked robbers tonight boarded the Grand Trunk passenger train inside the city limits, shot two passengers and secured some money and jewels. They escaped. One passenger was seriously injured.

LONDON, Sept. 5.—An Amsterdam dispatch quotes a Berlin newspaper as saying seven hundred thousand Russians are around Lemberg, which Berlin says the Austrians "evacuated."

Berlin says "the Russians suffered no big defeats except near Tannenberg, seventy-five miles southwest of Rostenburg."

NEW YORK, Sept. 5.—No crowd was at the depot today when Roosevelt left for New Orleans, where he speaks Monday.

LONDON, Sept. 5.—The Pall Mall Gazette says many English aeroplanes have been flying over the English channel and that the allies' aircraft equals the German's, numerically.

RHEIMS WAS CAPTURED BY GERMANS LITTLE RESISTANCE

TOWN CAPTURED IS SIXTEEN MILES EAST OF GHENT--BELGIANS RETREATING.

(By Associated Press.) NEW YORK, Sept. 5.—The Germans captured Rheims today without resistance; Dupleux' army today captured 12,000 men, 200 heavy and 150 light guns and six colors. This dispatch was received at the German embassy in Washington by wire as from Berlin today and was forwarded to New York and given out by F. D. Edler, Secretary to the German ambassador.

BAKER CO. BANKRUPT. NEW YORK, Sept. 5.—A petition in bankruptcy with liabilities listed at about \$1,400,000 was filed in federal district court today by Earl F. Baker and Herman N. Baker & Co., dealers in steel metal and hardware. Assets were given as about \$2,000,000.

THREE MAUBEUGE FORTS CAPTURED BY THE GERMANS

OFFICIAL FRENCH STATEMENT SAYS GERMANS ARE NO NEARER PARIS.

(By Associated Press.) PARIS, Sept. 5.—It was officially announced tonight, "three fortresses at Maubeuge were captured by the Germans, but the city still resists. No changes on the allies' left wing. The Germans enveloping movement there was definitely checked."

The situation is unchanged in Center and in Lorraine and the Vosges on the allies' right.

"The enemy is ebbing farther away from Paris but offensive works are proceeding actively. The Germans are moving southeast and have evacuated the region of Champagne and Reims," says the report.

SERVIANS DROVE AUSTRIANS BY STORM FROM SHABATSK

CLAIMS MADE THAT AUSTRIANS COMMITTED MANY ATROCITIES UPON SERVIANS.

PETROGRAD, Sept. 5.—Novoe Vremya, a correspondent says the Austrians held Shabatask, Serbia, for a fortnight before the Servians took the town by storm. The Austrians committed atrocities, pouring burning oil on the wounded Servians and bayoneted to death one hundred and twenty-five citizens before fifteen hundred women and children fled in a cathedral.

CONFERS WITH CARRANZA

(By Associated Press.) MEXICO CITY, Sept. 5.—Paul Fuller, representing the Washington State department, arrived here today and presented to Carranza an autographed letter from Wilson, congratulating constitutionalist chief on assumption of power and good order maintained.

Neither Fuller nor foreign office would make statement but foreign office admitted important matters were discussed.
