ROOSEVELT FAVORS STATE RIGHTS

Says Views of New York or Texas Have Nothing to Do with What Kind of Constitution Arizona Shall Have.

Phoenix, Ariz., March 20.—Colonel Roosevelt in a speech here this morning said the fact that Arizona adopted the initiative, referendum and recall in the constitution was not sufficient warrant for congress to refuse to admit her to statehood, and that the "jews of New York and Texas on the question" have nothing to do with the merits of the case.

A PERILOUS BUSINESS

ELEVEN MORE BILLS APPROVED

Including Provision for Instructor in Terracing for A. & M. College.

Austin, Texas, March 20.—Governor Colquitt today approved eleven bills, including the Hillsboro charter, the Abilene charter, the bill providing for a terracing instructor for A. & M. college, the railroad commission bill which authorizes it to regulate the rates of dock and terminal companies; the bill authorizing surveys for the construction of pools, lakes, etc.; the bill regulating the practice of professional nurses; the bill fixing the time of the Fifth judicial district court; the farm products experiment station bill, and the bill regulating the investment of fraternal associations' funds.

QUANAH MERCHANT WAYLAIED AND SHOT

BIG HOTEL FIRE AT CAMERON

GUESTS ESCAPED IN NIGHT CLOTHES, LOSING BELONGINGS—LOSS \$10,000.

Cameron, Texas, March 16.—The Ruby hotel, one of the leading hostleries of this city, was destroyed by fire at an early hour this morning. There were many guests in the hotel at the time and they barely escaped from the burning building in their night clothes, many of them losing all their belongings. The loss is about \$10,000 with no insurance.

BAN ON BULL STRAP

DALLAS COUNTY CONVICTS SHOW MARKS OF CRUEL BEATINGS.

Dallas, Texas, March 16.—The grand jury is making an investigation of the method of handling the Dallas county road convicts, and as a result the use of the bull strap may be abolished. Six prisoners testifying before the body claimed they were unmercifully whipped recently. One is scarred.

NOT WANTED BY EITHER SIDE

American Adventurers Get Little Mercy from Federals and Insurrectos Don't Care If They Get Killed.

El Paso, Texas, March 20.—"The Mexican insurrection is no place for American boys or American men. Conditions are hostile to them. The federal troops will show them little mercy and the insurrectos do not care whether Americans are killed or not." This statement was made today by H. C. Converse after visiting his son, Lawrence Converse, who, with Edwin Blatt, is imprisoned at Juarez. Mr. Converse said that since the state department made its representations to the Mexican authorities the boys are better treated in jail than they were before.

WORK BEGINS TOMORROW

Temporary Buildings To Be Erected for Flour Mill and Power Plant.

Work will start tomorrow morning on the erection of temporary buildings to be used while building the flour mill and power plant. Temporary buildings will also be used to store the three cylinders of the large engine.

To give some idea of the size of this engine it is only necessary to state that each of the three cylinders weighs 6000 pounds and the entire engine weighs 88,000 pounds. This is one of the largest Diesel engines in the United States, there being only three of the same size in use, and only one larger, which is at Effingham, Ill., where it furnishes power for lights and water.

In a letter received today Mr. Lawler states that the loading of the machinery is progressing as rapidly as could be expected and that the shipments will arrive in Bryan soon. He also stated that his father, J. T. Lawler, has returned from Cuba, and that they will both arrive in Bryan for permanent residence between now and April 1.

FINAL GINNERS' REPORT.

The final government ginner's report for the season 1910-11 came in today, showing 11,941,563 bales of cotton ginned to March 15. The report was about what the trade expected, and had no effect on the market either way. The market closed about like Saturday.

BOOKER WASHINGTON BADLY BEATEN

White Man Says He Was Peering Through Keyhole—Negro Says He Was Looking at Name Plate.

New York, March 20.—Dr. Booker T. Washington, the well known negro educator, was so painfully hurt by a beating on the head last night that he was unable to appear in court this morning against Albert Ulrich, a white carpenter, who is held under bail charged with felonious assault on Washington. The latter says he was looking at the nameplates in West Sixty-third street for a negro named Moore, to whom he had a letter which he had left at his hotel, when Ulrich attacked him without provocation. Ulrich claims he hit the negro, whom he found peering through a keyhole and whom he believed had spoken to his wife a few minutes before.

CENSUS FIGURES ON COTTON CROP

Last Crop Shows Increase Both in Number and Weight of Bales.

Washington, March 20.—The census bureau in a bulletin issued today shows the 1910 cotton crop to be 11,941,563 bales, counting round bales as half bales, compared with 10,386,209 bales for 1909.

In 1910 Texas produced 3,071,263 running bales.

Linters for 1910 were 397,592 bales, sea island 90,368 bales, and round bales 112,887.

The average gross weight was 501.2 pounds for 1910, compared with 496.6 for 1909.

In 1910 Oklahoma produced 954,433 bales, compared with 957,004 in 1909.

THE METHODIST REVIVAL

What is declared to have been one of the most successful revivals in the history of the Methodist church for many years was brought to a close last night when the after service was concluded with the old hymn of thanksgiving, "Praise God from Whom All Blessings Flow." The meeting was one of two weeks' duration and full of interest from the beginning. Larger crowds were in attendance during the week days and the capacity of the Methodist church was on several occasions taxed almost to its limit. The visible results have been between seventy-five and eighty conversions and reclamations, and to date forty-one applications for church membership with a few more to follow. Four of these will go to the Presbyterian church, one to the Baptist and the rest to the Methodist.

The preaching during the entire services was done by the pastor, Rev. Glenn Flinn, with the exception of a few children's services successfully conducted by Rev. A. C. Fisher, of Fort Worth, who, with his wife, had charge of the music. As leaders in
