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**HAD LIVELY CHASE  
 AFTER CAR BREAKER**

Had Lively Chase After Box Car Breaker. Constable Baker Made Red Hot Chase After Young Man Tuesday Afternoon,

Yesterday afternoon the officials of the I. and G. N. railroad at this place phoned to Constable Baker to come out and arrest a young white man for breaking into a freight car at the coal chute. Mr. Baker responded at once and when he got near the chutes the young man saw him and made a wild dash for freedom. The direction he chose was through fields which made the chase a long one as the pursuing officer had to find gates to get out of one field and into another. He went from the chutes out across the H. & T. C. tracks north of the Fin-Feather lake, through Mr. Sim Edge's place and across into the C. A. Adams pasture. When they came into this last enclosure the Constable was pretty close upon his man with a long straight run ahead. They had not gone far when the young man saw the game was up and that he could not hold out against a fast horse, so he threw up the sponge and came back to meet the officer, remarking that it was all off. He was brought to town and lodged in jail.

The court has decided to request the national government of Mexico to apply to the department of state at Washington for the extradition of the fugitive.
