ATTORNEYS CLASH IN HASKELL CASE

Special Government Attorney Rush Denounced Defense's Attorneys, Saying They Could be Disbarred for False Statements. Defense's Attorneys Roused.

Tulsa, Okla., April 7.—Special counsel Rush, representing the government severely arraigned the defense in the case in which Governor Haskell and others are charged with fraudulently obtaining lands. Rush denounced the defense for filing the motion to quash the indictment and scored the defense's attorneys for trying to prove that the government used improper methods to secure evidence.

Haskell's attorneys, aroused by this attack, are expected to reply in a similar spirit. Rush said Haskell's attorneys could be disbarred for false statements.

Judge Stewart will follow Rush,

speaking for the defense. United States Attorney Gregg will also speak and will be followed by defense's attorney. Both sides may rest tonight.

The government attorneys are confident since the court's ruling forbidding defense to introduce testimony given before the grand jury which found the indictments.

FITZHUGH DENOUNCES MEASURE

Says It Has Been Changed From the Strongest to the Weakest, and to Pass It Would be a Fatal Mistake. Passed to Engrossment.

Austin, Texas, April 7.—In the house today, Representative Fitzhugh joint author with Representative Robertson of the bill to regulate the liquor traffic disowned the measure in its present form, declaring that it had been so amended and altered that it had been dragged down from its high plane of the strongest measure ever devised for controlling the liquor traffic and had been emasculated until it had become the weakest. He said to pass it would be a fatal mistake.

Representative Davis of Brazos of-fered an amendment striking out the names of Robertson and Fitzhugh as authors and inserting the names of Lee and Stratton. The amendment was ruled out of order.

Discussion of this bill occupied the house all the morning, a number of minor amendments being offered. The bill was engrossed by a vote of seventy to forty-four.
