

CITY COUNCIL MEETING.

Members of School Board, Fiscal Agent and Mayor Pro Tem Elected.

The city council met for its regular tri-weekly session at 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon. Mayor Maloney and all aldermen being present.

On motion the four retiring members of the city school board, W. T. James, M. H. James, A. M. Waldrop and H. G. Rhodes, were re-elected for the ensuing two years.

The question of employing an engineer to appraise the water and light plant was taken up and after considerable discussion, a motion was passed that each member of the council suggest to the council the names of any engineers they may know that would be suitable for the business at hand. The name of Prof. J. C. Nagle of the College was suggested and met with much favor. An offer was made to him and he being in the city was invited to appear before the council, which he did, and told the body that he could not undertake the work. This closed the matter for the present and the city is still hunting for an engineer.

Alderman Fountain introduced a resolution in effect that as the water company had signally failed to furnish sufficient water for fire protection, that in future they be paid but \$25.00 per hydrant per year, instead of \$75.00 as they are now paid. The resolution was lost. Aldermen Fountain and Henderson voting aye, and Aldermen Covey, Derden and Edge voting no.

Alderman Edge introduced a resolution that an election be ordered to determine whether the future members of the city school board shall be elected by the people, or appointed by the city council as heretofore. The resolution was passed. A motion prevailed that said election be ordered and held as soon as possible to comply with the law relative to the time of publishing notice etc.

Mr. A. W. Wilkerson was reelected Fiscal Agent for the ensuing two years.

Alderman Edge was elected mayor pro tem.

The question of a new city hall and new fire station was discussed at some length, but no action was taken, and adjournment was taken subject to the call of the Mayor.

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TEXAS WOMANS COLLEGE NOTES.

Field Secretary Elected and Some Important Changes to be Made.

The board of directors of the Texas Womans College, has employed Rev. J. J. Pipkin of Huntsville as Field Secretary for the institution, and he will soon enter upon his duties. He will devote his entire time to canvassing this section of the state in raising funds and securing students for the school.

The first work of Rev. Pipkin will be to inaugurate a great rally in the interest of the school to be held in this city on the 27th of April. In this rally an effort will be made to get every minister, deacon and all others interested in the school, in this entire section to be present and get them pledged to the school to the end that great good may come from the renewed activity of its old friends and the new friends made through the rally.

An important change is to be made in the school, in that it is to be changed from a college to an academy in the belief that as such it can better serve the interests of the people of this city and section who have children to educate.

It is to be regretted that Dr. O. C. Charlton will not serve the college as president longer than the close of the present session, and has so notified the board. So far no steps have been taken to elect his successor.

There is no question but that the Texas Womans College is a great benefit to Bryan, not only in furnishing an opportunity for the girls of the city to be educated at home, but also from a financial standpoint. As it grows in strength and numbers it will become more and more valuable to the city and the Eagle hopes to see it receive the substantial support, the patronage, the sympathy and co-operation of the people.

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
