# TERRIBLE DROUGHT IN WEST TEXAS

No Rain in Six Months. Cattle Dying on Plains. Being Shipped Out of the Alpine Country.

Fort Worth, Texas, April 19.—Reports received here today from far western points in Texas say that cattle are dying of starvation by hundreds on the ranges. There is no more grass because of the long drought. In several localities the plains appear a barren waste. It is said that in some

parts not a drop of rain has fallen for six months.

El Paso, April 19.—In the Alpine country no rain has fallen since September and cattle are suffering. Ranchmen are moving their herds to Kansas as rapidly as possible to save them from starvation.

MRS. J. H. MAWHINNEY DEAD.

Genuine sorrow was brought to many hearts in Bryan last night when the news spread over the city that Mrs. Etta Mawhinney, the beloved wife of Mr. J. H. Mawhinney was dead. The end came peacefully at 6 o'clock in the afternoon.

She had been in feeble health for a long time, but of late she seemed to be improving and her relatives and friends were hopeful of her recovery. On Friday last, however, she was taken suddenly and seriously worse and never regained consciousness, but gradually grew weaker and weaker until the end came at the hour stated.

Mrs. Mawhinney was Miss Etta Watters, and was born in Houston Dec. 16, 1862, making her 46 years, 4 months and 2 days of age at the time of her death. She and Mr. Mawhinney were married in Houston Nov. 30, 1890, and with her husband has resided in this city continuously since.

She was a noble christian woman, a member of the Methodist church, and through her long suffering, was soothed and sustained by a christian fortitude that comes only to them who have a sure and steadfast anchorage in heaven.

Besides her husband, one child, a daughter, Miss Clara, is left to mourn the loss of wife and mother and to them and her other relatives is extended the profound sympathy of the entire community.

She was laid to rest from the family home at 3 o'clock this afternoon, her pastor, Dr. T. H. Morris, conducting the services.

THE REVIVAL.

The First Baptist church was crowded to the doors at the three services yesterday conducted by Evangelist Hayle. At the morning service he did not preach a regular sermon, but delivered a short talk in a conversational tone on "Mother, Home and Jesus." The address was one of great beauty and tenderness, and at the close of the service there were several accessions to the church.

At the night service he preached on "The Power of Christ to Heal From Sin" taking the scripture where Moses lifted up the brazen serpent in the wilderness, as a text. It was an eloquent presentation of the subject, and large numbers accepted the various propositions at the close.

Owing to the great interest manifested by the unaved, it was decided to continue the meeting until Wednesday night, at which time it will close.

There was a fine service this morning, and there will be preaching to-night at 7:45, and tomorrow as usual.
