## ROOSEVELT KILLED TWO LIONS YESTERDAY

Making Six in All. Now Holds Record as  
World's Greatest Lion Slayer.

Fifteen Year Old Lad Killed Hermit.  
Sister Says Self Defense.

San Angelo, Texas, May 5.—Claude Williamson, aged fifteen, was placed on trial here today, charged with killing Jack Schmidt late yesterday near the South Concho river. The only witness to the shooting was the boy's sister, who testified that her brother killed Schmidt in self defense.

Schmidt was a hermit living in a small hut near the river.

### FIGHT OVER UNIVERSITY APPROPRIATION

Hudspeth Wants to Increase It But  
Veale Opposes.

Austin, Texas, May 5.—A fight developed in the senate this morning over a proposed amendment by Hudspeth, which seeks to increase the appropriation for the state university from \$230,000 to \$270,000 annually. Veale argued against the amendment declaring that the state pays \$247 annually for each university student and only \$5.50 annually for the education of each country student. The amendment was pending when the recess was taken.

### WARSHIP TO ASCEND THE MISSISSIPPI.

At the conclusion of a six days' visit in New Orleans the Mississippi will proceed up the river for brief visits at Donnellville, Plaquemine, Baton Rouge and Natchez. After returning to this city the battleship will proceed to Horn Island to receive a magnificent silver service, from the State of Mississippi.

## HOUSE AMENDS GAME LAW

Adopts Senate Amendment Levying  
License on Hunting Outside of  
Home County.

Austin, Texas, May 5.—After considerable discussion this morning the house engrossed the senate bill which amends the game law by levying license on teams for hunting in counties other than their home county. Byrne attempted to increase the license tax for hunting outside of home counties to \$25 instead of \$1.75, but failed. Many representatives sought to exempt their counties, which occasioned such heated argument that Speaker Marshall ruled them out of order.

### CONGRESS WON'T ADJOURN BEFORE JUNE 15.

### VETERAN OF TWO WARS DEAD.

Waxahachie, Texas, May 5.—Captain Carr Forest, a veteran of the Mexican war and of the war between the states, died this morning at his home here, aged eighty-three. He has resided in Ellis county fifty-four years, and was well known throughout Texas.

### A. AND M. BOYS HAVING A TIME.

Won One and Lost One Game With  
the University at Austin.

Austin, Texas, May 5.—The A. and M. College broke even with the University in the two games played at Clark field, being the first time College has won on this field in several years, and as College won two games on Kyle field this season, it gives College seventy-five per cent of the four games.

The visit of the College team to Austin has been one round of reception and cordial treatment. The team made a tour of the state house, where they met all the officials from governor down, and they gave blue rabs in the governors office, and nine rabs in the senate, led by McDaniel, which is the first time such a thing has ever occurred. In the senate and in the house Col. James Hayes Quarles, Librarian of the College, was invited to make a speech, and he responded in each instance and told the legislators of the great work that is being done at the College in the education of the youth of the state. The fact that the deliberations of the house were interrupted that he might speak, was a distinction for the A. and M. that has never been accorded any school delegation which has ever visited here.

The A. and M. lost the first game. In the unlucky sixth the umpire made a decision against College that was deemed unjust, and this discouraged the boys so that they went up in the air and came down too late to recover the victory they almost had. It don't do to talk about what happened because it was awful, Mabel. However, the conduct of the young men was exemplary in the extreme, and they were warmly praised by all who saw what happened. It is a significant fact that the legislators, members of both house and senate, who were guests at the game by virtue of an invitation first extended Col. Quarles and later by Manager Bob Holliday of the University team, favored A. and M. in the game and wanted to see A. and M. win.

The second game was different. It was well played from start to finish, and A. and M. won a clean victory, and one that will long be remembered by all who saw it. There is one thing certain, University will never forget it.

## BOY'S HEAD CRUSHED RANGERS AT TYLER

Wagon Wheel Runs Over Him at  
Stamford.

Capt. Rogers and Five Men of Co. E,  
Ranger Force Will Help to In-  
vestigate Lynching.

Stamford, Texas, May 5.—Paul, son of W. A. Turner, was run over by a wagon and killed on a street of Stamford this morning. The boy was trying to climb the wheel when the team started, throwing him underneath. The little fellow's head was crushed. The family came here a short time ago from Cleburne.

### COTTON IMPROVED BY "SWEATING."

An East Texas farmer relates the following experience:

One year before the country went all to fruit and vegetable growing, I raised a nice crop of cotton—about ten bales—and when it had nearly all opened, I got a bunch of hands and made a quick job of picking it.

My cotton house was a small one, and to make it hold as much as possible, I had that cotton packed and tramped down just as tight as possible, until I crammed enough seed cotton into that little house to gin eight bales.

Then it began to heat up and go through a sweating process, and got so hot I began to fear it would actually catch fire and burn up, and had seriously considered taking it out of the house, and would doubtless have done so only a neighbor assured me that it would cool off and be all right, which it did in a few days.

Well, sir, when that cotton was ginned it was the finest sample of lint cotton that I ever saw, and sold on the market for 1 cent per pound more than precisely the same grade of cotton that had not gone through the sweating process. It was soft and passed into the lint, and rendered some of the oil in the seed and passed into the lint, and rendered it as soft and oily as fine wool.

If this farmer's theory of improving the quality of lint in a way which would add \$5 to the value of each bale of cotton is correct, it is certainly a valuable discovery, and it ought to be more generally known.—L. T. Moore, Rusk, Texas, in the Galveston News.

Tyler, Texas, May 5.—Captain J. H. Rogers, commanding Company E, of the Ranger Force, and Rangers Dahl, White, Hall, Averett and Clifford Stone, arrived here this morning at 11 o'clock.

Captain Rogers told the Texas News Service correspondent that he had no statement to make, but it is generally understood that the rangers were sent here to investigate the lynching of the negro, Jim Hodges, last Saturday. They will attend the trial of those arrested in connection with the lynching.

The examining trial of the nineteen arrested on a charge of participating in the lynching is set for tomorrow in Judge Simpson's district court. All efforts to secure the names of those arrested have proven futile, the sheriff saying that Judge Simpson asked that the names be withheld from publication until tomorrow.

### COUNTRY LIFE COMMISSIONER.
