PREPARE TO WELCOME WRIGHT BROTHERS.

Dayton, Ohio, May 6.—Under the direction of a citizens' committee plans are proceeding apace for the public welcome to be given to Wright Bros., the famous Dayton aviators, who are now on their way home from Europe. The brothers sailed for New York yesterday and are expected to reach this city in about ten days. The day of their arrival will be a gala one for Dayton. The mayor is expected to proclaim a public holiday for the occasion and the city will be elaborately decorated. Public men and others of prominence in all parts of the country are to be invited to take part in the demonstration.

According to advices received by Lorin Wright it is the intention of the brothers to come at once to Dayton upon their arrival in New York. They will remain here about a month to superintend the completion of the aeroplane that is to be used in the trials at Fort Myer in June. They will also take steps to provide facilities here for the manufacture of the machine on a large scale, inquiries and orders for a large number having already been received.

NAMES OF AL- LEGED LYNCHERS

Seventeen Prominent Citizens of Tyler on Trial Today. Courthouse Crowded to Full Capacity. Rangers will Preserve Order.

Tyler, Texas, May 6.—The authorities this morning gave out a list of the names of the citizens arrested on charges of participating in lynching the negro, Jim Hodges, last Saturday, following the attack on Miss Winnie Harman. These are the names: Lewis Adams, Horace Austin, R. E. Bryan, Ed Francis, John Wilkerson, Will Griffin, Sr., Ross Ford, Horace Turner, H. F. Lindley, Audrey Campbell, Joe Mattesota, Hodges, J. D. Sullivan, Lewis Francis, Birds Pyron, Walter Turner and Henry Paybrook.

The examining trials are scheduled to take place before Judge Simpson today.

Tyler, May 6.—Judge Simpson ar-

rived here this morning from Quitman and at 10 o'clock called the cases of all those charged with being implicated in the hanging of Hodges. Both the state and the defense asked for time to confer with the witnesses and the court granted the request and an adjournment was taken until this afternoon.

The big court room was crowded to its utmost capacity with witnesses and spectators. Judge Simpson announced that those who can not secure seats will not be admitted this afternoon.

Capt. J. H. Rogers and his five rangers reported to Judge Simpson for duty upon the arrival of the judge this morning. No further trouble is expected.

HOLSEY CALLS THEM GLABBERHEADS

Scores College Fraternities Says Members are the Sons of Nabobs.

Austin, May 6.—Halsey in the senate this morning, in discussing the university appropriation, criticized college fraternities claiming that the membership of such societies is composed of the sons of nabobs, whom the senator designated as "clabberheads," who depend upon the fraternity membership for success after leaving college.

The appropriation bill is still pending in the senate and the discussion of the measure dragged slowly this morning, enlivened now and then by pointed remarks of some speaker.

TESTIMONY IN MURDER CASE CLOSED.

GOVERNOR WILL NOT SAY

Whether He will Call Another Special Session or Not.

Austin, Texas, May 6.—Governor Campbell today refused to say whether he would call another special session of the legislature if this session fails to enact a bank deposits law. Commissioner Love says he does not know what the governor's intentions are in this regard, as well as a number of the members of the legislature who support the administration.

NOT AN AMENDMENT BUT A SUBSTITUTE.

Austin, Texas, May 6.—Lieutenant Governor Davidson today sustained a point of order by Terrell of McLennan, that the bank guaranty bill returned from the house is not an amendment to the senate bill, but a substitute for it; therefore, it is necessary to refer it to a committee before consideration. The bill was then referred to the senate committee on banking. An effort to suspend the rules to take up the bill immediately was overruled.

MOBLEY EXPECTS ANOTHER EXTRA.

Austin, Texas, May 6.—Representative Mobley, one of the leaders in the effort to pass a bill to guarantee bank deposits, today said that although he is not so informed he is confident that unless a bank deposit guaranty bill is passed or defeated in a direct vote and may vote in the house or senate, the governor will recall the legislature for a third special session.

NO THIRD EXTRA SESSION.

The Austin staff correspondent of the Houston Post is responsible for a bit of good news, if it be true. Here is what he says:

In view of the governor's insistence upon the passage of a bank guaranty bill, the question naturally arises: Will there be another extra session if the attempt to pass such a bill again proves abortive? From a source close to the executive the information comes that there will be no extra session.

If no bill is passed, the people will be given a chance to talk on the subject; and if they talk loud enough to warrant the conclusion that they really want a guaranty bill there will be an extra session later on to try to get it for them.
