ANOTHER STRONG SERMON.

A Fine Service Was Held in the Christian Revival Last Night.

The increasing interest and the results so far, have warranted the officers in making the statement that from the present outlook the services will continue indefinitely. The announcements for the week are as follows: Services every evening beginning at 8 p. m. Song service, 7:45 p. m. Morning service 9:30 a. m. Every morning except Saturday. The speaker took for the basis of his remarks the words of Jesus, found in John 17:20:21—"I pray that these may be one, even as Thou and I are one and that the world may know that Thou hast me."

Without a lengthy preamble, Mr. Thomas entered into an analytic discourse wherein it was clearly shown that the whole purpose of the author of the text was to keep out of the hearts and minds of the people and His disciples, derision, which is the mother of strife. The speaker quoted frequently from the acts of the apostles and letters to the Corinthian church in support of his claim.

He said: "Our plea commonly so-called, 'is not our plea but is the plea of Jesus, of Paul and John, of James and all the disciples eye and of all the authorities in church history, in fact. The world will never be evangelized until we as the followers of Jesus, take the Bible, and the Bible only, until we call ourselves Christians and Christians only. Nothing is more deadly to the progress of the doctrine of Jesus in foreign or for that matter in the home land, than this one to say I am of Paul another, I am of Appolus, another I am of Peter or any other name. It brings confusion, and when we consider that 'there is no other name given under heaven or among men whereby men shall be saved; 'it seems to me that the words of our text should counsel us to lay aside the man made creeds, and theories of D. D.'s and take the only position that is safe, and upon which all men can get together. Even the Bible.

Take it for what it says, and accept no creed but the Bible; accept no name but the name of Jesus. After an earnest appeal the invitation was given, to which two responded to the call.
