WILLIAM J. BRYAN MAY SETTLE IN TEX.

Will Visit South America After Which He Proposes to Move to His Texas Home.

Bellefontaine, Ohio, July 29.—William Jennings Bryan, former Nebraskan, is the way the Commoner's card is to read. He is to move to Texas, he said here yesterday in the course of an interview preceding his delivery of his "The Prince of Peace" lecture before 10,000 people. He declared he intended to move to Texas following a South American tour, on which he will start this week.

"I am not to seek election to the Senate from Nebraska," he said. "I am not going to be a Nebraskan, for I am going to move to Texas. I expect to continue in politics in Texas."

Mr. Bryan declared his belief in Mr. Taft's intentions, saying: "Mr. Taft will not be able to combat Senator Aldrich and the interests opposed to revision, however."

TEXAS NEWS BRIEFS.

BONES OF TEXAS HERO.

Those of a Soldier of the Revolution Found at San Antonio.

San Antonio, Texas, July 29.—While excavating for a building on South Alamo street, workmen excavated the remains of a soldier of the Texas revolution, evidently one of the heroes of the Alamo. While the skeleton was in a bad state of preservation, brass buttons from the uniform identified the body. The buttons were those of the five pointed star kind, having raised on the face "Republic of Texas," with the figure "1" in the center. Only members of the First Texas Infantry wore these buttons. The bones indicate that the man was a giant.

Dead Fish Pollute Streams.

F. M. LAW MADE RECEIVER

Of United Oil and Refining Company of Beaumont.

Beaumont, Texas, July 29.—On the application of George W. Carroll, Judge W. H. Pope of the Fifty-eighth district court appointed F. M. Law receiver of the properties of the United Oil and Refining company of Beaumont.

The application for receiver was filed by Dougherty, Conley & Gordon in behalf of George W. Carroll and alleged that the defendant had defaulted in the payment of an indebtedness to plaintiff amounting to \$10,000, the same being evidenced by two promissory notes. Plaintiff alleges other large indebtedness on the part of the defendant company and averred that it was to the best interest of the creditors that a receiver be named. In appointing F. M. Law, cashier of the Commercial National bank receiver for the defendant company, Judge Pope placed his bond in the sum of \$50,000, and directed the receiver to close down the plant and to make a complete inventory and appraisal of all properties of the defendant company and to file report of the same with the court within ten days.

Receiver F. M. Law qualified this morning by filing his bond in the sum of \$50,000, with F. E. Carroll, John C. Ward and M. L. Hinchee as sureties, and assumed charge of the property and closed down the plant.

MAN HURLED FORTY FEET IN AIR

Aged Austin Citizen Given Touch of High Life by Stick of Dynamite.

Austin, Texas, July 29.—John H. Noe, the aged caretaker of the Elizabeth Ney studio property situated near Hyde park, which now belongs to the Texas division, Daughters of the Confederacy and to be used as a museum, was hurled forty feet yesterday morning and severely injured by an explosion of a stick of dynamite. Noe was gathering some trash in the yard and burning it, and among this trash was this stick of dynamite which was thrown on the blazing fire.

Immediately there was a terrific explosion and Noe was thrown in the air.

His face and hands were severely burned and it is believed he received dangerous internal injuries.

The dynamite is believed to have been used in digging a well on the property some time ago.
