**NO AFTERNOON SERVICE.**  
The Methodist Revival Meeting Continues With Only One Service Daily.

At the afternoon service yesterday, Bro. Morris announced that that would be the last week day service. The meeting will continue until Sunday night, at least.

The subject for the afternoon talk was "Prayer", and is regarded by some as the pastor's best effort of the series. The nature of prayer, the hindrances of prayer and some of the results of prayer, were the divisions of the subject. The impression was good. The congregation was small.

In the evening another disappointing congregation faced the preacher. The subject was, "The Atonement," and the preacher pointed out the guilty condition of the race when their sins had separated between them and God; how no one on earth could help the other because he had not righteousness enough to save himself, and how Jesus alone possesses the qualities requisite in a redeemer, and how he gladly consented to undertake the work of atoning for man's sin and reconciling him to God.

The subject of the talk at Allen Academy this morning was, "Gambling," the speaker using for his text the eighth commandment, "Thou shalt not steal." He declared that gambling was a form of violation of this commandment and that, like theft, it revealed loose notions of property rights; and made those rights insecure, besides unfitting the man with gambling propensities for positions of trust, and closing all such positions to him. He deplored the well-known universal tendency of today to cultivate the gambling spirit in the parlor, on the athletic field, in the commercial schemes, and in speculation known as futures.

The subject of the discourse tonight will be, "The New Birth."
