CITY COUNCIL MEETING

Water and Sewerage Discussion But No Action Taken.

A regular meeting of the city council was held at the Secretary's office yesterday afternoon at 4 o'clock. Mayor Maloney presided, with Aldermen Covey, Fountain, Derden, Edge and Henderson present.

Minutes of regular and special meetings read and approved. Report of the fiscal agent and finance committee read and approved.

Alderman Henderson was instructed to write the Attorney General for an opinion as to whether or not the council had the right to control the city school fund and require a report from the school board.

The Secretary was instructed to collect \$30 from Palermo Bros. rent for scales in street, and also notify them to remove their scales. Secretary also instructed to present bill to Saunders and Nall for scale rent.

The committee appointed heretofore to investigate on advisability of having street scales removed, was granted further time.

Chairman Covey of the street committee instructed to cooperate with H. & T. C. officials for conveying standing water along their track.

Petition of South Texas Telephone Company asking permission to connect with the local telephone company, referred to ordinance committee to look up an authority on the subject. Both sides requested to have representatives present at next meeting.

Alderman Derden and Fountain were appointed as a printing committee.

Mayor Maloney called up the matter of the sewerage system and developing a water supply, but no action was taken.

Certain interest coupons and bonds were paid and destroyed in open council.

Council ordered that unpaid street tax be collected at once, and parties not paying be arrested.

Mayor Maloney reported that the \$10,000 city hall bonds had been sold to the First National Bank at par with accrued interest, and the bank was allowed to retain the money until expended.

Mayor instructed to confer with architect relative to changing south wall of city hall to pressed brick.

The question of free mail delivery was taken up and ordinance committee was instructed to confer with postmaster Myers relative to necessary steps to be taken etc. Alderman Henderson was instructed to prepare an article for publication explaining to the citizens the requirements to secure free mail delivery, its benefits, etc.

Proposition of the Valente Roofing Co., to furnish roofing for the new city hall referred to architect and building committee.

Adjourned.

The work was well done, and after studying and observing under guidance, she goes back to her own room still better prepared for work.
