





ALLEN ACADEMY WON

DEFEATED THE HOUSTON HIGH SCHOOL TEAM AT HOUSTON SATURDAY BY SCORE OF 17 TO 11.

OTHER FOOTBALL GOSSIP

A. and M. Made Monkeys of Holy Trinity at College Saturday Afternoon.

For the second time this season the Allen Academy football team on last Saturday put the grand "Kibash" to the Houston High School team at Houston to the tune of 17 to 11.

The winning of this game without question makes Allen Academy the state interscholastic champions. True they have not defeated the Waco High school, the game with that team being a tie, but the many games played and won, and the hard teams they have been up against, entitles them to the championship.

Of the game at Houston the Houston Post says:

"Ending with a score of 17 to 11 in favor of Allen Academy, yesterday's game between that team and the Houston High school told the old, old story of the superior team work of boarding school boys who live together over city school boys who have only their school work to bind them together. Throughout the game, which was very good for the class of teams represented, Allen Academy's team work and more constant and steady practice showed up with astonishing regularity. The High school team was composed of players equally as good, except in perhaps one or two places but they lacked the consistency and faith in their leader which would have won the game for them.

Charley Hudson starred again for Allen, proving the swiftest man on the field, a game player and a brainy captain. Vick at end and full, and Seale at half played a good game and good ground gainers. Ross made his end runs too long and lost ground several times. Boehme, though fearless about bucking the line, proved a bit slow. Hamilton at end played a good game. Pritchett kicked some pretty punts and two field goals, proving himself a valuable and reliable man. The entire line held well, not a creditable gain being made through them. Lyon at center was as solid as a pile of "first biscuit." The interference presented by the back field was an important factor in winning the game."

On Friday next the Allen Academy team will go to Waco and play Waco High school on Saturday. The Eagle learns that a special car will be attached to the regular train Friday and the team will be accompanied by the student body.

In the second half the remainder of the squad went in and took turns in making monkeys of the boys from the town where the State Fair is located. When the final whistle blew the score stood 47 for A. and M. to Holy Trinity's great big round goose egg.

Varsity Against Tulane.

The Texas University team went up against Tulane at New Orleans Saturday. Their (so-called) arch enemy, Jubiter Pluvius still pursued them and they were forced to play again in the rain and mud. They put up a hard fight but Tulane was Johnie-or-the-spot and the final score was 10 to 10.

The big game between Yale and Princeton at New Haven, the sons of old Eli were again victorious by the crushing score of 17 to 0.

A. and M. leaves tonight or tomorrow for Dallas and will play Oklahoma University in that city Wednesday. Oklahoma has a fine team and the boys expect a hard struggle. "Big Jim" Ross, a former A. and M. star is on the Oklahoma team.

On next Saturday the Oklahoma team will play the State University at Austin, and the big Thanksgiving game between A. and M. and Varsity will close the season.
